

The Philippine Problem.

Probably no man in the country is better informed in regard to the conditions and possibilities in the Philippines than the Hon. William H. Taft, now Secretary of War, formerly Governor-General of the country's island possessions in the far east.

Outlining the situation from the beginning of the war with Spain, Secretary Taft went over the eastern question, and gave a summary of what has been accomplished by the Government in discharging the trust it assumed with the acquisition of the islands.

Turning to education, the Secretary said the most encouraging and gratifying feature was the eagerness with which the Filipinos were applying themselves to the study of English.

An irreproachable American personnel in the administration of the islands, he said, was necessary. "The man in the office there who steals," Mr. Taft put it, "steals the honor of the United States."

Concluding he said: "If we keep before us the motto: 'The Philippines for the Filipinos,' and do nothing that is not to the credit of the United States, we can certainly work out the problem before us."
