Death of Levi A. Waterman
 The following taken from the Mercury, Ill. Plaindealer, of Sept. 29th will be of interest to many of the older residents of Lamolle County.
 Levi A. Waterman was born in the town of Johnson, Lamolle County, Vermont, October 26, 1816, and died at Ringwood, Illinois, September 19, 1905, his age at the time of his death being 86 years, 10 months and 23 days.
 He grew to manhood in the state of his birth, his early life being spent much as that of other farmer boys of his time. His parents were Asa and Anna Dodge Waterman, who both lived to an advanced age, his father dying at the age of 88. He was united in marriage November 25, 1851, to Hannah Dodge Whiting. They lived on the old farm in Vermont until the autumn of 1865, when they sold out and emigrated to McHenry County, Illinois, purchasing a farm about two miles northeast of Ringwood, where they lived until 1886, when they moved to Ringwood, to the home they had built and where both have died. Mrs. Waterman passing away January 18, 1903.
 There were born of this union five children. Walter W., of Lewisville, Minn.; Anna A., Lucinda W., and Howard L., of Ringwood, and Elmer, who died when a small child, in Vermont.
 Mr. Waterman had been in usually good health, until March of the present year, since which time he has been almost continually confined to the house, slowly but surely wearing away.
