Sweetser, buck, shot in Elmore; Hugh Campbell, Harry Neuland, Joe Barrette and Joe Beritt, does. Charles Hinds, George Robson and Atlee May of the west part of town got a buck and two does Monday. Dan Draper shot a doe early Monday morning. Other local successful hunters were Wm. Bailey, Joe Bassett, Rufus and Ralph Stanceliff, Leon Ward and a son of J. P. Miller of Hyde Park.

Following are those reporting to Game Warden Henry Hall in Elmore up to this noon:—Claude Kendall, George Preman and Julian Gay, does; Walter Desell, Alton Lawson and O. K. Cochran, bucks, Charles Burbank and Herb Rooney each got one in Garfield.

Seven have been shot in Garfield and all the other towns in the county have a good number to their credit. Stows is the banner town, upwards of 30 having been captured there.

Henry Morse, who lives on the Jay Sherwood farm in the west part of town, was the victim of the first accident reported in town since the deer season opened. He was going down the Johnson side of Mt. Sterling Monday forenoon, when he slipped on a rock, dropped his rifle, which was discharged, shooting off two middle fingers from his left hand. He walked a short distance farther down the mountain, when he was met by two hunters from Johnson, who stopped the flow of blood and hurried him in a team to Dr. Prentiss' office in Johnson. He was taken to the Fanny Allen Hospital Tuesday, where the hand was dressed. It is hoped that the rest of the hand will be saved. Mr. Morse is about 35 years old and has a wife and four children.


