## Found Unconscious by Track

Ralph Atwell, a man between 35 and 40 years of age, was found lying unconscious by the St. J. & L. C. track near the Wolcott station at about seven o'clock Tuesday morning, by the train crew of the express train going west. The man was picked up and brought to Morrisville, where he was taken to the Red Cross rooms and a physician called. Medical aid, however proved unavailing, and the unfortunate man died without having regained consciousness. His body was taken to the M. B. White undertaking rooms, and on Tuesday afternoon Dr. B. H. Stone of the State Laboratory came from Burlington to perform an autopsy, from which as yet no report is available.

Mr. Atwell was a native of Eden and is survived by a wife, who lives in Hardwick. He had made his home in Wolcott for some time. A curious coincidence of the case is the fact that Mr. Atwell's father was found in exactly the same circumstances six years ago, lying unconscious by a track in Canada, and died in the same way.
