JOHNSON GIRL GIVEN HONOR

Smith College Alumnae Association Votes to Give Miss Edith Leslie A Course

The Smith College Alumnae Association of Vermont, at a special meeting held at the home of Mrs. Edward S. Dana in Rutland July 10, voted to give a scholarship covering full tuition at the Smith College Training School for social work to a Vermont teacher, Miss Edith Leslie of Johnson, who is a teacher in the Northfield public schools. Miss Leslie will return to her work at Rutland in the fall, so that the Smith women feel that they are benefiting the state school system, which is one of the most progressive in the country, and therefore deserves their support.

From 1916-1920 the association gave a half scholarship to a Vermont girl, graduated in the class of 1920. This girl, Miss Alice Abbott of Newport, graduated with honors and has recently been awarded a foreign fellowship which gives her the opportunity of spending the next year in Spain, Spanish having been her major at Smith.

The course for teachers and visiting teachers, which is offered by Smith this summer for the first time is in line with a strong trend among educators to give each child the benefit of individual understanding, and, if needed, of special treatment.

The visiting teacher, who is now employed extensively in larger cities and in some smaller, including Rutland, whose high school has one such teacher on its staff, looks out for the children who for any reason are not getting along well in school.

Many of these are cases for the school nurses, but others are not due to ill health. Sometimes a child gets too little sleep and too much home responsibility. Sometimes unexplained absences mean the beginning of bad associations, which can be nipped in the bud, and thus much trouble and often court trials and prison terms are avoided.

Sometimes the shy girl or the sullen needs just a wise friend, who understands—and this the visiting teacher is ready to be, and trained how to be.
