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### Vermont National Guard

Tenting Again on the Old Vermont Camp Grounds Near Fort Ethan Allen.

Over 1,200 officers and enlisted men were present at the opening of the annual encampment of the 172d Infantry, First Vermont National Guard, Saturday. Col. Ernest W. Gibson of Brattleboro, commanding officer of the regiment, states that he is greatly pleased with the attendance, especially of the officers, which is 100 percent.

The 19 companies of the regiment arrived, most of them by train. The detrainment of the troops and the subsequent transportation of the baggage and erection of the canvas city was well carried out, no confusion hindering the troops in the completion of their camp.

Adj. Gen. H. T. Johnson of Montpelier, in addressing the officers that evening, remarked upon the attendance and the speed and confidence which attended the first day of camp.

Sunday was quiet. Many of the men attended services in the morning in camp and in the city, the camp service being conducted by Chaplain Chauncey Adams of Danville. The troops are in rugged health and displayed great enthusiasm in the morning in bettering the various company streets so that the camp in the afternoon appeared as an impeccable tented city.

### CAMEL'S HUMP

Easily Reached by New Ferry Across River at Bolton and the Long Trail

The summit of Camel's Hump is now only 28 1/2 miles from Burlington, or eight miles from Waterbury by rail, boat and trail.

Formerly the mountain climber who desired to reach the summit of this unique peak of the Green Mountain range had to travel much further than this to get there. But Ernest Smith, chairman of the trails committee of the Burlington section of the Green Mountain Club, has built in his shop and launched on the Winooski river at Bolton a ferry boat capable of carrying six passengers besides the oarsman, and this boat will be operated by a man who lives nearby, for the benefit of mountain climbers, and under the management of the Green Mountain Club.

It is only a few steps to the ferry boat from Bolton station and it takes only a few minutes to get across the river. From the opposite side of the river it is four and one-half miles by trail to the summit of Camel's Hump. There is no bridge over the Winooski river between Jonesville and Duxbury.

This ferry makes it very much easier for hikers over the Long Trail from Camel's Hump to Mt. Mansfield, going either way.

### The Vail Camp

Last year the University of Vermont sent to Camp Vail at the great Eastern States Exposition at Springfield, Mass., the best four teams. Those were chosen out of 100 competing teams, and were as follows: Handicraft Boys, St. Johnsbury; The Jelly Making Girls, Underhill; The Millinery Team, Pittsford; The Dairy Calf Club Team, Glover.

The U. V. M. will send its four best teams this year. Two girls' teams and two boys' teams. There are 230 clubs organized in the state, so at least 230 teams ought to compete for the trip to Camp Vail. This trip includes transportation both ways and subsistence for the entire week in Camp and is absolutely free to the teams and their leaders. These teams from Vermont to Camp Vail are financed by the Eastern States Exposition and the Vermont State Banker's Association.

### Death of Mrs. Abbie M. Fletcher

The many friends of Mrs. Abbie M. Fletcher are saddened at the news of her death, which occurred in the Springfield, Mass., hospital Wednesday, August 2, after nearly a week's illness from appendicitis. She was taken to the hospital the second day of her illness, and an operation was performed and everything done that could be done, but she could not rally. Funeral services were held in Springfield Friday afternoon and interment was made by the side of her husband in the beautiful Agawam cemetery near Springfield.

Her husband, William H. Fletcher, a veteran of the Civil War, died nearly 20 years ago, and, though living in Massachusetts at the time, his remains were brought to North Hyde Park and buried beside the little son who died years before, but were removed five years ago to Agawam and re-interred, where she now lies by his side.

Three children survive: Will A. Fletcher of Thompsonville, Conn.; Mrs. Arabel Mason, wife of Rev. John Mason of Hyde Park, Mass.; and L. Percy Fletcher of Springfield, Mass.; also by ten grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The deceased was 79 years, one month and four days of age, but looked and seemed much younger. Since her widowhood, she had made her home with her children, mostly with the son, Will, but had passed several of the summer seasons with relatives and friends here in northern Vermont, where she was always a welcome visitor.

She leaves one brother, L. T. Griswold, of Morrisville; one sister, Mrs. B. T. Ober, of Johnson, and a host of friends in this vicinity who will sadly miss her.
