### A New One-Cent Postage Bill

Washington, D. C. Nov. 26.—Congressman Geo. W. Smith of Illinois has arrived in Washington and announced that he will introduce a penny postage bill as soon as Congress is ready for business. Mr. Smith has fathered similar measures which never have made much progress, as the revenue of the post office department have not been considered sufficient to warrant a reduction in the rate. He believes the increased income of the department justifies a reduction from two cents to one. Senator Mason is on record as in favor of such a measure.

### Cuba's Campaign Getting Hot

Havana, Nov. 26.—A demonstration in the interest of Thomas Estrada Palma for the presidency of Cuba completely countenanced the late Maso boom. The feeling of the partisans is intensifying. Leaders on both sides anticipate a great struggle. Gen. Maximo Gomez has entered the fight in a vigorous manner and has with him many of the Cuban soldiers. Gen. Maso says it is impossible to beat him. He reiterated his friendship for the United States government, and his approval of the Platt amendment.

### WANTS TO SEE CONGRESS

Requests That He Be Allowed to Express the Desires of the Filipinos

Manilla, Nov. 26.—Aguinaldo has written Gen. Chaffee, the military governor of the Philippines, asking the latter's permission to go before congress and express the desires of the Filipino people.

Aguinaldo further requests that he be accompanied by eight friends whom he designates, four of whom are prisoners at Guam, while the others are prominent at Manilla.

Sexto Lopez, who has been in the United States and Europe, in the interest of the Filipino insurgents, and who is now at Hong-Kong has written to Aguinaldo asking to be exempt from the oath of allegiance to the United States upon his arrival at Manilla, asserting that this action might injure his labors in the behalf of peace.

A fund is being raised by the Federal party in Manilla for the purpose of attempting to prevent the execution of the Filipino Gen. Isidoro Torres, who surrendered to the American authorities in the early part of this year and who was later tried on charge of having violated the rules of warfare and sentenced to death. Several Congressmen will be asked to exert their influence in favor of Gen. Torres.

## COUNCIL MEETING

Waterworks Proposition Before Council

REPRESENTATIVE APPOINTED

To Work for an Early Appropriation—Other Interesting Matters Discussed

We only have one kick and that is we are barred out of the executive meeting where we understand all the fun takes place, but then we will do our best to help make things interesting for all during open sessions.

The council met last night with Mayor Divers in the chair and a full attendance of councilmen. It was an interesting and profitable session from start to finish and we give reports of committees below.

Expense bills for holding the late city election were presented to the council last evening and referred to the proper committee.

The Anadarko Waterworks company presented a proposition to construct and maintain a system of waterworks. The proposition was laid over until next meeting.

The committee on sidewalks reported in favor of twelve foot walks on C street from Fourth to Eighth streets, fourteen on B street from Fourth to Seventh and a twelve foot walk on A from Fourth to Seventh street.

The committee appointed to solicit aid for the sick reported \$37.70. Councilmen Gallagher, Elston and Manning were appointed to distribute the same.

An ordinance was introduced prohibiting the keeping of barber shops open on Sunday and making it punishable by a fine of from \$5 to \$25, and a fine of from \$5 to \$15 on each barber.

The ordinance renaming the streets was passed over.

W. H. Edwards presented a petition by the residents of A against changing the name of that street from its present name to Texas avenue.

A petition was presented asking for a sidewalk on Seventh street north from B to right of way.

Two hundred petitioners asked to have Eighth street opened across the main line and Lawton branch of the Rock Island.

The committee on street and alleys reported accumulations of refuse in many places and the sanitary policeman was instructed to notify the citizens to clean up and to report all who neglect to do so to the city attorney.

A proposition to vote \$50 to pay some one in Washington to work for an appropriation for the city and to keep the city government informed of the progress made called out talks from W. W. Price, Julius Oldham and Randall Livesay. Each speaker favored concerted action on the part of each of the new county seats, the appointment of a committee to confer with Lawton and Hobart with a view to bringing all possible influence to bear upon Congress, but to work with Congressman Flynn.

The committee was appointed as suggested, consisting of the city attorney and councilmen Liebenhiem and Manning.

Council adjourned to meet Wednesday evening.
