## BOMB THROWING.

### Unsuccessful Attempt at Hobart

### FIRE EXTINGUISHED IN TIME. A Mystery as to Who Did the Devilment

Last night about 10 o'clock a terrific explosion occurred in the alley in the rear of the Kiowa State Bank building. The explosion was of such terrific force that it jarred the buildings for a whole block and threw a portion of the bomb to the roof of the Clyne building, more than half a block away. As it happened the roof of the Clyne building is gravel and could not ignite. Had it lighted upon any of the frame buildings in that row a conflagration would have started which would probably have wiped out the entire block. The police have as yet no clue to the parties who exploded the bomb and is well for them that their identity is unknown. The police and many private citizens, however, have their suspicions as to the guilty parties, and have detailed a force to keep watch and should another bomb be exploded there will be a neck-cracking party organized instantly.

### Murder to Avenge Insult.

Oklahoma City, Jan. 10.—Wm. Peoples, a prominent cotton buyer of this city, to-day shot and killed Eugene F. McLaughlin, a clerk in a drug store here. Peoples accuses McLaughlin of insulting his wife. This morning he walked into the drug store where McLaughlin was at work behind the counter and shot him twice. Peoples then went to the sheriff and gave himself up and is now in jail.

## FOR OKLAHOMA'S STATEHOOD.

### Committee on Territories Is Organized and Date of Hearing Set—Memorial Distributed.

Washington, Jan. 10.—The committee on territories was organized in the house today and Jan. 23 set for hearings in the Oklahoma statehood bill. A sub-committee of which Dennis Flynn is a member, was appointed to report on the Moon bill which provides a territorial form of government for the Indian territory. There is little question but that this sub-committee will strongly favor the bill. This will pave the way for Delegate Flynn's bill for the admission of Oklahoma as a state.

Every member of the house today found on his desk a printed memorial praying for the admission of Oklahoma into the Union as a state, signed by Sydney Clark, A. J. Seay, F. E. Gillett and Dick T. Morgan, as the memorial committee. The document presents a concise and vigorous argument in favor of admission.

Secretary Hitchcock today urged congress to make an appropriation of \$5,000 to establish the boundary line between the Choctaw nation and the state of Texas.
