DISASTROUS FLOOD.

A Waterspout at Foss in Custer County, Oklahoma.

DROWNS TWELVE PEOPLE.

Flood is Sweeping Bridges Before it. Will Reach Anadarko this Afternoon.

A telegram from Mountain View to Colonel Randlett received at nine o'clock this morning, states that a waterspout at Foss, Custer County on the Washita, drowned twelve people early this morning and caused great loss of property in the town and river bottom. The flood, a huge wave several feet in height is sweeping along the Washita with the speed of a mill race, carrying on its crest the wreckage of barns, houses fences and tons of logs and drift. The flood at Mountain View showed in a river which extended from ridge to ridge in the valley. Bridges are being swept before like matches and as these tons upon tons of heavy timbers sweep along the boiling current, they in turn serve as huge battering rams in destroying bridges in their path. Thousands of dollars worth of stock will be drowned, as their owners will have no time to drive them to the hills. Chief of police Al Burchett and the Indian police at the agency, were riding over the bottoms early this morning notifying every one to move instantly to high ground. Messages of warning have been sent from here on down the river. Grave fears are entertained for the safety of the wagon bridge at the agency. From all reports it is an unprecedented flood in the annals of Washita bottom. A great many people went over from the city to the agency early this afternoon to see the probable approach of the flood wave.

NEW COTTON MILLS.

Can Be Secured for Anadarko. Are Anxious to locate Here.

PLANT TO COST \$25,000.

Citizens Here Expected to Subscribe \$15000 Worth of the Stock.

Oklahoma City Okla., May 3, 1902. F. E. Penn & Co., Anadarko, O. T., Gentlemen:

In regard to cotton and wollen proposition the plant which you can secure for your city for \$25,000 is a thoroughly up-to-date plant. It is a complete 3 set mill, consisting of three 30 inch cards, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two spindles, six spinning machines, one hundred and four looms, complete standard dye and finishing machine, double set rollers, engines, laths and other power machinery, equipped for both cotton and wollen fabric manufacturing. The mill capacity is 115 hands, wages will average a little over \$1 a day. The machinery of this mill cannot be bought new for less than sixty five thousand (65000) dollars. All the machinery is in first class condition. The mill in its present location has paid regular dividends from the date of its establishment. An option has been secured on this mill and I have already found two men who will not only be glad to handle the superintending the mill, in such location that may be found for it, but will put money in the mill at the price at which it can be secured.

Twenty five thousand (25000) dollars buys the plant. The town that gets the mill will have to arrange for site and building. Site and buildings ought to be provided for at least five thousand (5000) dollars. The cost of moving the machinery would probably be about five hundred (500) dollars. You mentioned the fact that twenty five (25) or thirty thousand (30000) dollars looks cheap. It is cheap. This plant installed in any town will stand good for seventy five (75) or one hundred thousand (100000) dollars.

We located a Wollen-Cotton mill in Oklahoma City in 24 hours and you could not buy a dollars worth of the stock for less than two or three times the amount, the original subscribers paid for it. Mr. T. C. Newby, who will be the superintendent of our mill here, has at my instigation inspected the mill, on which option has been secured, and pronounces it one of the best bargains in the milling industry. You might write to him T. C. Newby Box 14, Springfield, Mo., for his opinion in the matter. He is a practicable mill superintendent and knows what a mill is. As I told you before there are other points which are very anxious to get this plant, but I would like to land it for you in your city, as I believe it would be a success from the start there, and a big success.

Now the way for you to do is just like we did here. Get up a subscription sheet as per the enclosed sheet, have three subscription papers and get the \$1000 men on one paper and the \$500 men on another paper and the smaller subscribers on another paper. As you will notice by form of subscription, the subscriber is bound to nothing unless the committee selected by the subscriber find on inspection that the plant is what your town wants. If Anadarko is going to do any thing this is sure opportunity to do it. I will do all I can to help you.
