THE BIG FIGHT IS ARRANGED

Jeffries and Fitzsimmons Agree on Terms of the Contest.

TO BEAT SAN FRANCISCO.

Fight Will Be Pulled off in California About the Fourth of July.

San Francisco Cal., May 21.—James J. Jeffries, champion heavy-weight pugilist of the world, and Robert Fitzsimmons met this afternoon and came to an agreement to fight for the world's championship. Fitzsimmons insisted that he would not fight unless permitted to wear surgical bandages for protection of his hands. After some parley on this point, Jeffries receded from the position he has assumed recently in objection to the bandages. The articles of agreement will, to all practical purposes be identical with the articles signed in New York some months ago.

After the men had announced their satisfaction with the articles it was mutually agreed that the documents would be signed on Friday afternoon. Seven clubs submitted bids for the fight, and after a brief discussion Fitzsimmons told Jeffries he would leave the matter of a selection of a club to him; with the result that Jeffries after some deliberation expressed the opinion that the bid of the San Francisco club, offering 70 per cent of the gross receipts was the best. Fitzsimmons accepted the suggestion and it was agreed that the contest would be held under the auspices of the club mentioned.

The date of the contest will be decided later, but it is generally believed that July 4th will be the day determined upon.

Edie Graney, a local man will be asked to referee the contest, and doubtless will accept. Jeffries will train at Harbin Springs and Fitzsimmons at Skaggs Springs.
