HON. W. J. BRYAN.

Tendered a Royal Reception by our Citizens His Lecture.

"A CONQUERING NATION"

The Grandest Treat That The Citizens of Anadarko have Ever Heard.

The train bearing Hon. W. J. Bryan arrived here yesterday at 11:40 a. m. Hundreds of our people were there to greet him, both bands were on hand to discourse music, the school children and their teachers were there also and presented a beautiful appearance. It is truly wonderful to see the high esteem in which Bryan is held by the American people of all classes. They seem to recognize him the highest type of American citizenship, honesty, integrity and ability. As he walked down the depot platform a mighty shout went up from those present. He was taken in charge by the following reception committee of ten members of the K. P's: Chancellor Commander, E. B. Widaman, Vice Chancellor, R. E. Cleveland, Mayor W. H. Edwards, T. H. Brooke, Worth Farmer, Randall Livesay, R. Z. McAninch, M. Hester, Ben Leibenheim, Dr. Mitchell and L. D. Blankenship. Three carriages were waiting at the depot and the party gave Col. Bryan a drive over the city which he greatly enjoyed. He expressed himself as being wonderfully surprised at our modern church buildings, our fine residences, our large two story brick business blocks, all built in the past 17 months. After the drive over the city he was taken to the Windsor Hotel where before he could alight from the carriage he was surrounded by hundreds of school children all eager to clasp his hand. It was one of the grandest sights we ever witnessed, to see the little ones almost falling over each other in order to shake hands, as several of them expressed it with the President. The crowd at the Windsor insisted on a speech and Mr. Bryan stood up in the carriage and made a short talk. At the conclusion of the speech he was roundly applauded. In the hotel corridor he held an informal reception. A great many shook his hand and congratulated him upon the great battle he had made and was making for the common people. Immediately after dinner each member of the Ladies Band was introduced to him. He congratulated the ladies for the excellent music furnished by them. The Ladies Band then headed the procession for the Hall where Mr. Bryan was to speak. As he entered the hall another cheer went up from the crowd. Then the Ladies Band played a selection which Mr. Bryan said was a credit to any band and he could hardly believe that this band had only been organized a few months. Mr. Bryan was then introduced to the crowd by L. D. Blankenship. His speech upon the subject "A Conquering Nation," was an oratorical treat that one is seldom permitted to enjoy. For almost two hours he held the audience spell bound. His argument was logical and convincing. Those that differed from him politically were compelled to acknowledge that his conclusions were true. Mr. Bryan closed

his speech just 10 minutes before train time and hurried to the depot there to learn that his train to Hobart was an hour and thirty minutes late. He was very anxious to visit the River Side School while here, so in company with the reception committee he was driven over to the beautiful and picturesque schools nestling at the foot of the hills on the banks of the Washita. They were met at the gate by Mrs. Campbell, wife of Prof. Campbell. She gave the party a warm reception and expressed herself as being delighted to have Col. Bryan visit the schools. Mrs. Campbell made each one of the party soon feel at home and escorted the party up the walk and into one of the recitation rooms. Here was a room full of Indian boys and girls about 15 years of age. Prof. Campbell being absent at the time the party arrived, Mrs. Campbell dispatched one of the Indian boys after him. The party while waiting for the Prof. were entertained by declamations and singing by the Indian boys and girls.

Col. Bryan made a short talk to the class, in which he said he was glad to see the red man being educated, and in his talk referred to the beautiful drawings and paintings that the school children had done. He selected several of the drawing to take home with him. Among the ones selected by him was a drawing of radishes which Mr. Bryan said was so natural that if he got hungry he could eat them. About this time Prof. Campbell arose and showed the party, hurriedly through the different school rooms, as the time was limited. He was introduced to all the faculty and we regret that we did not get the names of the instructors, but their work show them to be splendid instructors. Col. Bryan said he greatly enjoyed this part of his visit, as it was a great benefit to him, and spoke very highly of Prof. Campbell and his work. He and Prof. Campbell are old friends having known each other at Washington, D. C., when Mr. Bryan was in congress. The party hurriedly left to call on Col. Randlett on their way back to the depot. When they reached Col. Randlett's office there was only time for an exchange of courtesies as the train was at the depot, upon which our distinguished visitor was to leave the city. The party whipped the teams into a good run and the train was reached just in time for the Col. to get on board. He carries away with him many pleasant recollections of his visit to Anadarko. The citizens for their unselfish work in entertaining him, the Ladies' and Men's Band for their excellent music and to the K P's for their Friendship, Charity and Benevolence.
