### Rosebud Sioux Land To Be Allotted

Norfolk, Neb., Feb. 2.—The Daily News says that Indian Inspector James McLaughlin of Washington has just secured an agreement with the Rosebud Sioux Indians for the throwing open by the federal government of nearly a million acres of land in Tripp county, S. D. as soon as the details can be attended to. Major McLaughlin, who made the treaty with the Sioux for the government for the purchase of the Gregory county portion of their reservation, which attracted the Bonesteel rush was sent west several weeks ago to make a treaty along the lines of the Burke bill, and this was accomplished. The Indians are to receive \$6 per acre for the land taken by settlers during the first three months; \$4.50 for that taken during the next four months and \$2.50 for that including school lands.

All Indian children born within the past eight years are to receive allotments. This allotting will require, it is estimated, about a year. All lands untaken after four years will be auctioned off to the highest bidders.

The opening will be conducted similar to that of the Gregory lands. There are 1,094,000 acres of reservation land in the county, which will be reduced to about 700,000, it is estimated when in-allotments are extracted.

Fritz Leudtke, who lives 2 1/2 miles north of Anadarko, reports an unusual accident. He was putting hogs in a wagon when one of the larger ones got away, passing between his arm and shoulder and twisting the shoulder out of place. He finds the sprain exceedingly inconvenient, as he cannot dress himself or use his arm for some time to come. Mr. Leudtke believes that under certain circumstances hogs are an aid to the study of astronomy, as he saw more stars and comets and meteors for a minute than ever our brilliant Oklahoma heavens can show.

### Presbyterian Social

Guthrie, Okla., Feb. 1.—Both sides claim victory in the action of the constitutional convention, which this afternoon adopted in the committee of the whole, the amended Williams substitute for the majority report of the liquor traffic committee, providing for the submission of the prohibition question to the people of the entire state as a separate ordinance.

Only six votes were registered against this measure while 93 were cast in its favor. Thirteen members were absent. Asp, Harned, Humphrey, King, Latimer and Lee voted in the negative.

An amendment offered by Leahy of Pawhuska, providing that the counties in Oklahoma where 20 per cent of the tax payers petitioned therefor, an election should be called and a majority vote determined whether liquor licenses should be issued in that county, was defeated by a vote of 71 to 24.

Before adjournment, Hughes of Oklahoma City, served notice that he would propose an alternative local option measure to be submitted along with the prohibition proposition, so as to give the people of the state the right to choose between the two methods for control of the liquor traffic.

As finally adopted the Rose substitute submits to the people the plain proposition of for or against prohibition. At the majority vote is affirmative the provision establishing prohibition in the Indian Territory and the Indian reservations is to be in effect throughout the entire state.

If prohibition is defeated, it will be the duty of the first state legislature to enact laws for the regulation of the liquor traffic in what is now Oklahoma territory.

### Revival Meeting

The revival meetings which are being conducted by Beach and Beach, Evangelists, at the court house are proving quite successful. Thus far nineteen have been added to the church, also, something like \$300 was raised and the indebtedness on the Christian church property has been cleared. The preacher is a hard worker and presents the gospel with much force and effect.

Mrs. Beach is a sweet singer and adds a great deal to the progress of the meeting. She sings a solo each evening. Last night the subject of the sermon was, "Christ Our Mediators." The speaker first cleared away all erroneous opinions concerning the law acting as a propitiation and showed that we were under the new dispensation which was ushered in by Christ. The doctrine which Christ taught, as far as we are concerned, covers everything that is given us by the law. Christ is the way, the truth, and the life and no man cometh to the father except by him. A number of apt illustrations were given to show that all are indeed very sinful and are unworthy to approach God. But Christ stands as our mediator with the Father for us, and through Christ we are made fit subjects to approach the throne of God, Christ is the only one who can defend us.
