In compliance with the Statutes of the Territory of Oklahoma relative to the nominations by Primary election of candidates for municipal offices. The Republican city central committee Anadarko, Oklahoma hereby call a Primary Election to be held in said city of Anadarko, Okla., on the 14 day of March A. D. 1907, between the hours of 11 o'clock A. M. and 6 o'clock P. Suffers from Rare Disease.

Suffering from a rare disease, the most marked symptom of which is a decay or crumbling of certain of the vertebrae of the spinal column, John P. Miller, of New York, is interesting the surgeons of Fordham hospital. Miller is unable to stoop over and touch his toes, but can bend backward with ease, the bones and muscles of his back being as supple as rubber. The surgeons of the hospital have had six consultations over his case within as many weeks, and have had several prominent surgeons of the city in the hospital to consult with them as to the best way to attempt to cure the case. Some of the surgeons think that by opening the spine to the seat of the trouble they may be able to treat the part in such a way as to arrest the dissolution of the bone.
