

A Great Surrender.

The greatest surrender in the annals of warfare was that of Metz, on October 27, 1870. As a fortified place Metz, with its surrounding forts, was practically impregnable, but bad generalship permitted it to be completely surrounded and cut off. The surrender included three field marshals, sixty-six generals, 6,000 officers of lower grade, 400 guns, 100 metralleuses, nearly 100,000 standards and 173,000 rank and file.
