## CANNON TO AID HAMON?

Republicans Believe Lawton Man is Digging Deep Pitfall For Frantz.

Is the attendance of Speaker Cannon of Illinois, and a whirlwind speech by him against the constitution and statehood, with promises of a new enabling act at the next session of congress, containing a legislative apportionment ready-made for the new state, one of the big cards which Jake Hamon of Lawton plans to spring on Governor Frantz and his cohorts at the Tulsa convention?

Chairman Hamon yesterday admitted that he had been in communication with the speaker of the national house of representatives, but declares that he has not yet received a definite answer.

The interest Cannon has taken in the question of statehood, and his known opposition to statehood, which is declared to mean a solid democratic delegation from Oklahoma in the next congress, influences local republicans to feel that there is no question that Cannon will accept the invitation.

"There is no doubt that the presence of Speaker Cannon will have large influence in preventing the Tulsa convention from declaring for the nomination of a state ticket and the adoption of the constitution," said a local republican leader who has been known to be friendly to Frantz.

Should Speaker Cannon see fit to take such a personal interest in the matter, and in his address ask the delegates to oppose the proposed constitution, as an undemocratic document, at the same time promising them to use his influence to secure the passage of a new enabling act at the next session of congress which would in its provisions prevent the democrats from obtaining any of the political advantages charged against them in the present constitution, there is little doubt that he would carry the convention by storm, and resolutions will be adopted declaring against the ratification of the constitution or the nominating of a state ticket. In that event the convention would naturally turn to Hamon, and the man who has consistently opposed a state ticket to lead the fight as state chairman.

The announcement that Cannon coming has caused consternation in the ranks of the Frantz followers in Oklahoma City. Caucuses were held all over town yesterday, and numerous long distance messages to Guthrie were transmitted. The Frantz men in Oklahoma City are not falling over themselves at best, in opposition to Hamon, and there are at least half of them who would utterly refuse to vote against him for state chairman in favor of James R. Cottingham, William Grimes, or any other resident of Guthrie. Hamon has always been friendly to Oklahoma City, they say and they fear the election of a Guthrie man would cost Oklahoma City the state headquarters. Despite the enthusiastic claims of the Frantz crowd, it is believed that Oklahoma county's 45 delegates will hold the key to the situation in the Tulsa convention. They are in revolt at the demand that they support a Guthrie man for state chairman and the purpose of the

caucuses yesterday was to bring another man to the front. Ed S. Vaught of Oklahoma City, who seems to have assumed a firm hold on the party reins in Oklahoma county, is said to aspire to the place himself. The Oklahoma county delegation is instructed for C. G. Jones, but they don't take Jones seriously. As a final compromise, local republicans yesterday demanded of Frantz that he pick some Indian Territory man to oppose Hamon for state chairman.

It is believed that Pliny L. Soper of Vinita will be Governor Frantz's choice, should he decide to back an Indian Territory man.

## I. C. C. CUTS GRAIN RATE

Holds That Territory has Just Cause of Complaint Against Rock Island

Washington, D. C., July 26.—In a decision announced today by Commissioner Prouty, the interstate commerce commission holds that the territory of Oklahoma has just complaint against the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific and other interstate carriers on account of their rates on wheat and corn from Oklahoma to Galveston, Tex., for export. After a hearing of the case the commission has decided that the rates are unreasonable and has ordered them to be reduced.

## A New Railroad in Oklahoma

The American Midland Railroad company, with its principal place of business at Guthrie, was chartered July 22 to build a line having an estimated length of 2,100 miles, of which 450 miles will be in Oklahoma. The proposed line begins at Langdon, N. D., and runs through North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Indian Territory to a point near Galveston, with a branch line from Winnsboro, Tex., to Coal Gate, I. T., and another from Coal Gate to Poteau, I. T.

The capital stock is fixed at 60 million dollars. The director are U. C. Guse, B. F. Hegler, jr., and C. B. Havighorst, Guthrie; Henry Oppenheimer, Frank Jerome Hoyle, Meyer Oppenheimer, Charles F. Senkowski and Lamar Lyndon, all of New York City.

## No 2-cent Fare on Kansas Roads

Kansas City, July 26.—The state board of railroad commissioners today received letters from representatives of the Union Pacific and the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway companies declining to put into effect in Kansas, emergency passenger fare rates of two cents a mile during the pendency of the litigation to test the validity of the two cent fare laws in Missouri and other adjoining states. The letters were in answers to a request from the railroad commissioners that the railroad put into effect a two cent fare in Kansas, at least during the time the two cent fare laws are observed in Missouri, Nebraska and Iowa.

## Object to Jap Labor

Guthrie, Okla. July 26.—The Eastern Oklahoma Independent Cotton ginners' association held a meeting here today, 40 gins being represented, for the purpose of discussing the handling of the cotton crop, this fall. A protest was issued against the introduction of Japanese labor for chopping and picking cotton as suggested here several days ago by M. Chuman, the Omaha labor and immigration labor.
