Local Players Make a Rally in the Seventh and Pull Out a Victory

Anadarko and Fort Cobb met again on the local diamond Sunday and Anadarko again came off the victor with a score of 9-0. Ft. Cobb led with the run getting, putting two men over the plate in the first and two in the second inning. The game looked like Ft. Cobb's until the seventh inning when the local boys jumped on Estes, the Cobb pitcher, and landed on the ball at will getting in five scores. They had run in two scores before, one in the fourth and one in the fifth making a total of seven.

Anadarko started off badly, making several bone-head plays in the first and second innings, settled down and backed up their pitcher. The main reason for Anadarko winning this game as well as many others is in the way that no matter how bad the game looks they play base ball until the last man is out.

James caught pretty ball and pilfered the bases at will. Williams, the new, man made good at short. Hazlett was dissatisfied with a decision of the umpire in the first half of the ninth and withdrew his men the game being called 9-0 in favor of Anadarko.

FOUND BODY OF INDIAN BABE

Coroner Called to Investigate But No Evidence of Crime Discovered

Sunday morning word was received in the city that the body of an infant had been found buried in the sand in a secluded spot about four miles south of Anadarko, the impression being that the find had unearthed a grewsome crime.

Coroner McCray of Binger was at once notified and in company with Deputy Sheriff Draper and several others from this place a visit to the scene of the find was made. A careful investigation disclosed the fact that the body was that of an Indian babe about four months old, it evidently having been buried some time.

Every indication pointed to the fact that those who had interred the body had done so carefully, the manifest intent being to give the little one decent burial. The body was incased in a cracker box and had been clothed in all of its baby clothing with its little playthings and trinkets carefully placed by its side. The body had then been covered with a large Indian shawl and the grave filled in.

The grave was not deep, but the dirt above it had been rounded up showing the nature of the place. The find was made by a man who chanced to be passing, and his suspicions being aroused he secured a shovel and made an investigation with the result that the officers were called.

There was no indication whatever of any crime, nor could any information be secured showing whose child had been buried in the place.
