AWARD GAS LEASES

Oklahoma City, April 13.—Kate Barnard, state commissioner of charities and corrections, Monday was awarded an oil and gas lease on tract number 6, in the Arkansas river bed by the state school land commission. She proposes to use the proceeds to build a home for homeless and friendless working women and girls of the state. She bid 15 1-2 per cent gross production on oil and 7 1-2 gross production on gas besides the regular 12 1-2 per cent. George Brentuall, Cleveland, Okla., was awarded tracts 1, 3, 4 and 5 on 15 per cent oil and gas gross. H. G. Barker of Hennessey, was awarded tract 5 on 12 1-2 oil and 21 per cent on gas.

14TH ANNUAL OKLA. CITY EXCURSION

Oklahoma City business and professional men will leave on the morning of April 27th for a tour of Oklahoma and northern Texas. This is the Fourteenth Annual Trade Excursion which has been operated from Oklahoma City and will visit 78 towns and cities located in 20 counties of Oklahoma and three in Texas, a total distance of 764 miles, returning to Oklahoma City Saturday afternoon, May 2nd.

The party this year will be composed of 150 men, representing almost every line of trade, including wholesalers, manufacturers, insurance men, bankers, professional men—in short a representative party from the metropolis and Capital of Oklahoma, carrying a message of good will and optimism to the people of the communities visited.

The train is composed of 9 cars including 5 of the best cars that can be furnished by the Pullman Company; also Standard Dining Car and three steel Baggage and Coach Cars furnished by the Frisco.

The Excursion will travel through a territory varied in its resources and characteristics. The first and second days will be spent in the great oil and gas producing region and portions of the coal region, after which the trip will be through the great cotton belt in the southern portion of Oklahoma and northern Texas, then westward into the alfalfa, corn and wheat belt of Oklahoma.

At each stop the members of the party headed by the First Regimental Band of Oklahoma, composed of 20 pieces, one of the best bands in the southwest, will march through main streets of the town, congregate at a central point, give the Oklahoma yell, and disband to make personal calls upon customers and friends. In the meantime the band will keep things lively, and frequently speakers will extend felicitation on behalf of the people of the Capital City of Oklahoma. Members of the party will be equipped with white caps with black visors and black bands bearing the words "Oklahoma City" in gold letters; also red arm bands, with the initials "O. C."

The purpose of the trip is to promote a feeling of harmony and good-will and a spirit of cooperation among the cities and towns of the southwest in the interest of the general development, prosperity and success of this region, and incidentally to advertise the great business and commercial houses of Oklahoma City. The towns to be visited are not expected to provide any entertainment for the visitors other than so far as possible to suspend the regular routine of business, affording an opportunity for the visitors to get acquainted with the citizens of the town and surrounding country. Personal acquaintance is the prime object in making these trips.

At many of the night stops it is probable that mass meetings will be held in some available auditorium, where music, speaking and other form of entertainment may be given.

The slogan of Oklahoma City is "Pull Together for the Development of the Southwest," and with magnificent prospects for a successful year now before us it is hoped that by all cooperating great things can be accomplished in 1914.

School Board Meeting

The School Board met Monday night and transacted the following business. The secretary reported that he had a talk over the phone with Mr. Jim Thompson who was getting printed a new set of books for the Board and that he said he would not be able to get the books ready before about Thursday. A motion was made and carried that county treasurer be notified that Mr. Wester was the legal treasurer of school District A and to turn the funds of the district over to him.

Mr. Bristow attorney for the bondsmen of the former treasurer reported that they were in a position to make settlement with the Board along the line suggested by the Board and asked that a committee be selected to meet with the bondsmen and go over the securities and Ballinger, Davis and Livesay were selected.

One of the members of the Board reported for Atty. Morris relative to the fees for conducting the case provided he had to sue the bondsmen for the shortage of the former treasurer that his fees would be 10 per cent of the amount collected which seemed satisfactory with the Board.

The secretary reported that they had some four hundred dollars in the tuition fund and by motion it was transferred to the salary fund.

The Board went on record as opposed to paying the janitor for the colored school holding that the county should pay it.

The teachers committee made its report recommending that all the teachers with but one or two exceptions be selected for next year which was adopted.

Livesay made motion that Miss Icy Carter's name be added to the list of teachers which was voted down because the board seemed to think that that would be one more teacher than was needed but all seemed favorable to Miss Carter if for any reason a vacancy should occur.

Motion was made by Williams that they proceed to vote for superintendent by secret ballot the motion was amended by Davis that it should be by open ballot but the amendment lost and they proceeded to ballot electing F. M. Kimes of Norman as superintendent.

Livesay moved that salary be fixed at \$1400 motion lost, Williams moved to make it \$1300 motion lost, Ballinger moved to make the salary at \$1200 which carried.

Livesay and Williams tried to get the vote fixing the salary at \$1200 reconsidered but failed.

Balyeat was elected principal and his salary fixed at \$1000.

GUNMEN ARE EXECUTED

Albany, N. Y. April 13.—The four gunmen, slayers of Rosenthal were executed in the electric chair in Sing Sing prison early today.
