HE CAN'T KEEP OUT OF FIGHT

Oyster Bay, N. Y., May 20.—On the first day after his return from South America, Theodore Roosevelt got back into touch with the political situation and tonight plans were well under way for the Progressive campaign of 1914.

A large part of the day Colonel Roosevelt spent in conference with George W. Perkins of New York, chairman of the executive committee of the Progressive National committee. Mr. Perkins has been steadily at work since the 1912 campaign in organizing the new party in all sections of the country and his mission to Oyster Bay was to acquaint the former president with present day conditions in the field of politics.

Gifford Pinchot, the Progressive candidate for United States senator from Pennsylvania, also had a long meeting with Colonel Roosevelt. He reached Sagamore Hill this afternoon and spent the night there.

Colonel Roosevelt's political activities removed all doubts whether he would take an active part in the campaign this year. It is known that he expects to make one of the most arduous fights of his career. Although no definite plans have been formed, it is probable that in September he will make a trip across the continent, speaking in most of the states.

On May 30, Colonel Roosevelt will sail for Spain, for the wedding of his son, Kermit. In the intervening period he will attempt to start into motion the machinery for the campaign. On his return from Europe, about July 1, he will begin the campaign proper.

One day of the quietude and bracing air of Sagamore Hill wrought a great change in Colonel Roosevelt's appearance. Tonight he was full of vigor. There was no trace of the fatigues that was noticeable when he left the tug which brought him home last night.

Tomorrow Colonel Roosevelt goes to New York.

Washington News Letter

From the Bureau of Publicity, National Rivers and Harbors Congress.

Washington, D. C. May (Special)—With the beginning of work on the Alaska railway, for which the general government has appropriated \$30,000,000, all sorts of "wild cat" mining schemes will be unloaded upon the people of the United States, if they are not careful, according to a statement made by Elwood Bruner of Nome, Alaska, a Senator of the Territorial legislature. Mr. Bruner, who has been in Washington for the past four months looking after several bills before Congress in which the legislature of Alaska is interested, said, before leaving for his far north-western home, "The people of the states must fight shy of wild cat mining schemes which promoters will foist upon them. It has been the constant aim of the legislature of Alaska to keep the credit of the territory first class. When the question of a government-owned railroad came before the legislature it was most generally conceded that the moment the bill making appropriations for the road had passed Congress, it would be the signal for the advent of hundreds of 'Wallingford's' and get-rich-quick adventurers who later on would drift back to the states in due season, with the most unheard-of stories of rich finds, fabulous placers, and a wealth of description that would out-Munchausen old Baron Munchausen himself.

"In view of these conditions I would advise the people who are seriously considering the purchase of Alaska mining stock to go slow. Get some one in whom you have confidence to examine the property before you purchase, otherwise you stand to get stung good and hard."
