It is not his fight he is waging but your fight, and you ought to rally to his support as long as he fights for you and your rights.

Don't wait until you meet him where no one can see you, to tell him that you are with him and that he may depend upon you as long as he is fighting for good government...

Let us determine to do right as we understand it, let us meet our duties of citizenship in a patriotic spirit; a spirit that makes soldiers for the right, and let us turn to God, beseech His guidance...

How few are honest with God. A man must not think because he is in God's sanctuary he is any better than his life out of it calls for.

Men with themselves must pass for what they are. They know when they do wrong, and stand convicted of this wrong doing, by their conscience, whether they are ever discovered by men or not.

Does the saloon keeper who violates the law respect the citizen who winks at his transgression, or does he count him a partner in his wrong doing, without the benefit of sharing in the profits arising out of his violation?

Those who select an unworthy man as a candidate for public office are just as good citizens as those who vote for him, knowing what kind of a man he is, and I don't care what ticket he is on, either.

There should be no more sentiment in politics than in any other business transaction.

No man can do unclean things to get an office and enter that office free of the dirt he has waded through to reach it. No public conscience and no official conscience can rise higher than their mentor, private conscience.

Men who go into a certain business know what the law is and if they are not content to abide by the law, then let them stay out of that business, or take the punishment the law gives for its violation, if they do violate the law.

Men who seek and receive public office know what duties the law places upon such officers and if they do not approve of the law, or dare not through cowardice enforce it they ought to stay out or resign.

I believe in the decent observance of the Sabbath day. I believe in obeying the law. I do not believe that any power, short of that created by the people, can abrogate or nullify the law.

and to demonstrate thereby that there is power enough in our form of government to enforce all of the law.

There rests the further duty of seeing to it that the law as a law, shall not be tried by a jury, to be evoked or rejected at will.

If the law is tried, then ends protection of person and of property, for the application of the law will depend upon the will of its triers, and the plain purpose of the law may be nullified.

If the law may be condemned and nullified at the will of those who are selected to administer it, then their will, and not the will of the people as made into law, will govern, and the court will become but a farce.

Is it lawful to incite and abet those engaged in the law's violation? Whether the law can be enforced, and whether only the players of the game are engaged in breaking the law and should be held, therefore, are questions that can best be answered by the authorities of Ingham county.

The prosecuting attorney of my county has done his best to compel observance of the law and no censure attaches to him because of its failure. Good citizenship calls for backbone; it demands manly men; men morally clean; men who dare to look and discover evil and say that it shall end, men who will not wink at the laws transgression because it is to their financial interest to pretend they are blind; men who are honest enough to place principle above the dollars and moral worth above financial worth or policy.

Good government, honest administration of official duty, demands in return good citizenship from those who enjoy its blessings, and this with as much right as good citizenship demands good government.

The obligation is mutual and if you have not done your share toward maintaining the relation, and in helping to elect or reelect men who dare to stand for good government, will you do so in the future, whether you agree with them in politics or not.

When an element starts in to defeat a man who has dared to do his whole official duty, good citizens should meet them man for man and not inquire of politics until good government has been vindicated.
