#### Military Bill Will Not be Signed.

Announcement is made that Gov. Warner will not sign the military bill recently passed by the legislature. Under its provisions all the state troops would be mustered out of service and the men would have to re-enlist if they desired to retain their present membership. The bill was loosely drawn and was faulty in many particulars. The Governor will ask the legislature to consider the bill again when he calls a special session.

#### Shiawassee Mutual Fire Insurance Co.

H. A. Chapin, of Lansing, examiner for the Michigan Insurance Department, recently completed his annual examination of the books of the Shiawassee Mutual Fire Insurance Co. As usual he found everything in the office of Secretary Frank H. Rush in good shape. His report shows the membership on June 10th as 3,613, an increase of 54 since Jan. 1st; the amount at risk Dec. 31, 1906, was \$7,073,139, at the present time, \$7,207,849; cash on hand, \$1,212.08, with no liabilities.
