GARY BUSINESS MEN ANGRY
 Granting of Fifty-Year Franchise for Street Railways is the Cause.
 Gary, Ind., May 17.—Business men of Gary, and especially members of the Commercial club are in arms because the city council majority, after a long and stormy session, ratified a fifty-year franchise, granting traction rights to Charles H. Geist, the Philadelphia gas magnate, and his Calumet United Railways company. Further feeling was created when it was learned that Mayor Knotts, instead of exercising his veto, signed the franchise ordinance, and as a result investigations and probable impeachment proceedings are hinted at.
 The franchise gives Geist a fifty-year right to use the streets of Gary. The lack of provision for universal transfers, the permission to charge a straight nickel fare, the use of nearly all the streets and the lack of a forfeiture clause for failure to comply with the terms of the grant are bitterly assailed.

SENATE SCORES JUDGE
 Illinois Body Will Not Appeal in the Tilden Case.
 Springfield, Ill., May 17.—The senate virtually decided not to take an appeal to either the supreme or the appellate court from the decision of Judge Pettit of Chicago freeing Edward Tilden, W. C. Cummings and George M. Benedict on habeas corpus writs.
 Senator Hurlburg introduced a resolution scoring Judge Pettit for his "unwarranted interference with the prerogatives of the senate," and said that the senate "greatly depletes" his activity in the matter.
