Corn Binders

The McCormick corn binder has an extremely wide range of adjustment. It will cut short or tall corn, and corn that is tangled and lodged. This adjustment for different lengths of corn can be made from the driver's seat. It is not necessary for the driver to stop the machine to make the change. This is an advantage, because frequently the operator finds both tall and short corn in the same field.

The McCormick corn binder is so constructed that the bundles are bound while in a vertical position. The corn is cut and moved along in a position upright to the binding attachment. It requires less power to bind the corn in this position, and evenly batted bundles are insured. Elevation attachment can be used in place of bundle carrier.
