Out of the class of 476 freshmen who entered the Michigan Agricultural College this fall, 100 were found delinquent in grammar and 150 in spelling in a recent examination in which it is stated that the questions asked were in no sense technical. The poor showing is declared to be the result of improper teaching of these important subjects in the high schools of the state.

Since the county system was adopted 211 miles of roads have been built, leaving 50 miles to complete the county system. This has been accomplished in a very short time through bonding the county.
