The case of Agnes Vavra of Venice township against Martin Vavra has been discontinued in the circuit court. Mrs. Vavra sued for a divorce, but her husband was afterwards arrested on a statutory charge and sent to prison. Since that time his wife decided not to press the divorce action.

Mrs. Harriett Almada Cole died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mary Crook, west of Vernon, Monday, Nov. 6th, aged 98 years, 9 months and 19 days. Mrs. Cole has been a resident of this county since 1875. She leaves three daughters, Mrs. Harriett Reynolds of Kerby; Mrs. Laura Phoenix of Indiana, and Mrs. Kelsey of Pollaaki, N. Y. also one son, Wm. Cole of New York state.

The two-story frame dwelling at Bennington village occupied by Wm. Cline and family, was totally destroyed by fire Saturday night, the fire starting in the roof. Conrad Cline, father of William, was asleep upstairs and was rescued just as the burning embers began to fall into his room. The house was owned by Thomas Phillips, of Owosso, and was valued at \$3600, with \$1800 insurance. Mr. Cline's loss was covered by insurance.

The commissioners will meet Tuesday, Nov. 14, at the village hall in Durand to hear testimony in regard to the necessity of the drain. The proposed drain was petitioned for last January by Veron township residents. Attorney Elmer Atherton appeared for property owners who are objecting to the drain. It was at first desired to have a jury, but later the contestants decided on the special commission.

Mrs. Johanna Strehl, aged 82 years, died Friday at the family home in Owosso township, where she has resided for fifty-one years, coming here from Germany. The funeral was held Monday afternoon at the First M. E. church, Rev. E. J. Warren officiating.
