**Formation of Veins of Gold.**

Newfoundland has an area of 42,734 square miles, which is not quite six thousand square miles less than the area of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick or it is just twice the area of Nova Scotia alone. Across the straits of Belle Isle and up the north coast of the mainland is Labrador, which is a dependency of Newfoundland. The exact boundary between Labrador and the province of Quebec has not yet been definitely fixed, but Newfoundland claims, at least, 120,000 square miles on the mainland, which added to the island area makes a total of 162,734, which is almost one-half the area of British Columbia.
