

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 15 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance for the care, preservation and control of the water works of the City of Owosso and all the fixtures, appurtenances, buildings and machinery connected therewith or belonging to and governing the construction, management and control of said water works," passed and approved June 14, 1915. The City of Owosso Ordinance:

Section 1. That Section 15 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance for the care, preservation and control of the water works of the City of Owosso and all the fixtures, appurtenances, buildings and machinery connected therewith or belonging to and governing the construction, management and control of said water works," passed and approved June 14, 1915, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. All metered water rates shall be paid quarterly. For purpose of meter reading and collection the City is hereby divided into three districts. District No. 1, to consist of all premises served from Cedar street and all that portion of the city lying west of said Cedar street and the river, and west of the Shiawassee street, to comprise all services on Washington street and in that portion of the city lying east thereof north to the Shiawassee street and District No. 2, to comprise all services on Washington street and in that portion of the city lying east thereof north to the Shiawassee street and District No. 3, to comprise all services on Washington street and in that portion of the city lying east thereof north to the Shiawassee street and District No. 1, to comprise all services on Washington street and in that portion of the city lying east thereof north to the Shiawassee street and District No. 2, to comprise all services on Washington street and in that portion of the city lying east thereof north to the Shiawassee street and District No. 3, to comprise all services on Washington street and in that portion of the city lying east thereof north to the Shiawassee street.

Section 2. The metered rates of District No. 1 shall be paid during the months of January, April, July and October of each year; those in District No. 2 in the months of February, August and November; and those in District No. 3 in the months of March, June, September and December. After the first day and before the 10th day of the month following the month in which the water rates are payable in each district, the City Clerk or water collector shall send a notice to the address of each service in that district upon which any unpaid water rates due on the last day of the preceding month, giving notice that if such unpaid water rates are not paid on or before the 20th day of the month in which such notice is sent, the service shall forthwith be closed until such water rates are paid. Immediately after the 20th day of the month in which such notice is sent, the City Clerk or water collector shall send to the Commissioner of Public Utilities a correct list of all services in such district where there are unpaid water rates, and the said Commissioner shall thereupon cause all such services to be closed. Whenever the water for any services shall be turned off for an arrearage in water rates, or of any violation of this or any other ordinance or of any rule or regulation of the Commissioner of Public Utilities, as hereinafter provided, the water for such service shall not again be turned on until the full amount of all arrearages existing on said service together with a charge of One Dollar to cover the cost and expense of turning off and turning on said water, shall be paid in full to the City Clerk or water collector. The Commissioner of Public Utilities may close any service as well as to comply with any rule or regulation promulgated by him or of any ordinance of the city, relating to the use of water or plumbing or connections therefor, as for arrearages in rates, whenever such violation shall come to his knowledge, and shall cause the same to remain closed until such violation shall be corrected, and the cause shall be corrected, as the cause may be. All flat rates, whenever given, shall be paid in advance, and the water for such service shall not be turned on until such rates have been paid in full. Whenever water is used by a private individual firm or corporation from a city hydrant, the Commissioner of Public Utilities shall be notified in writing of such use, and shall thereupon furnish a competent person to open and close such hydrant, and the minimum rate for such use shall be added to the water rate, both such expense and rate to be paid in advance by such individual, firm or corporation. Whenever two or more parties are supplied by the same service pipe, upon the failure of any one of said parties to pay the water rates due or to comply with all the rules and regulations of the Commissioner of Public Utilities and ordinances of the City of Owosso relative to water service, the supply of water to such service pipe shall be cut off, as in the case of a pipe supplying single service, without liability of the city or said Commissioner for damages or inconvenience caused thereby to the other party or parties. Any person wishing to discontinue the use of water service shall give written notice to the City Clerk or water collector, and on failure so to do shall be liable for all water used, or for the minimum rate, until such notice shall be actually given.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after its passage. Passed and approved Nov. 28, 1921. A. T. WRIGHT, Mayor. Attest: B. K. LUCAS, City Clerk.

THIS AGREEMENT, Made and entered into this 31st day of October, 1921, by and between the City of Detroit, Michigan, represented by Stutman, Superintendent of the Detroit House of Correction, duly authorized Agent for and in behalf of said City, party of the first part, and the County of Shiawassee, Michigan, represented by Board of Supervisors, duly authorized Agent for and behalf of said County, party of the second part.

Witnesseth: Whereas, the party of the first part, for and in consideration hereafter mentioned, agrees to receive into the Detroit House of Correction, safely kept, board, clothe and care for, any and all persons who may be sentenced to confinement in the said Detroit House of Correction, by any Court or Magistrate in the County of Shiawassee, Michigan, to-wit: For all persons sentenced for any period not less than sixty days, One Dollar and twenty-five cents per day each, or any part of day. It is hereby agreed by and between the parties hereto, that this agreement does not cover any person or persons who may be sentenced to confinement by any Court or Magistrate in said County for any term less than sixty days, and persons so sentenced shall not be committed to, confined, received or kept in the said Detroit House of Correction, but shall be committed to, confined, received and kept in the County of Shiawassee, Michigan, under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Detroit House of Correction, to be furnished with transportation to the place from whence received, or given the equivalent in money, and the amount so expended shall be repaid by the party of the second part quarterly as hereinafter specified.

The party of the second part, in consideration of the before mentioned stipulations to be performed to the party of the first part, agrees that all persons convicted in the County of Shiawassee, Michigan, of offenses under the Disorderly Act or of crimes not punished by imprisonment in the State Prison or Reform School, and who are sentenced by any Court or Magistrate, shall be sentenced to imprisonment in the Detroit House of Correction, and shall be forthwith conveyed to and delivered into the custody of the Superintendent thereof, and to pay all lawful drafts drawn upon the Treasurer of the County of Shiawassee, Michigan, for board, care, discipline and money expended for return transportation, etc., of persons so sentenced and delivered, according to the terms of this agreement, quarterly, viz: on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year of the continuance of this agreement.

(The party of the second part further agrees) (to furnish the party of the first part an affidavit of the due publication of public notice) (of this agreement, and of the fact that the same is filed within said County, and in case to) (paper is published in said County then and) (for a period of not less than two weeks, and) (in some newspaper published within the jurisdiction of the County of Shiawassee, Michigan, and in a district to which said County is attached) (for a period of not less than four weeks, and) (such notice shall state the said term of time for which this agreement will remain in force, and) (as provided for in Section 2162, Mich. Com. Code Laws 1897)

It is Further Agreed, by and between the parties hereto, that this agreement shall continue for one year from the 31st day of October, 1921, and shall be binding and self enforcing to its full term, and shall be renewed from year to year, until the expiration of the term of this agreement, and until the parties hereto, or either of them, have and has by these presents the right to annul this agreement at any time during the continuance thereof, when written notice of the intention to so annul shall have been served by one party upon the other party, at a date not less than one month previous.

KEEP PRODUCERS INFORMED

Farmers Advised to Study Market Reports in and Out of Season to Keep Posted.

(Prepared by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.) How can the farmer and stock raiser turn the live stock reports of the bureau of markets, United States Department of Agriculture, into dollars is frequently asked. The answer is for the farmer to get so much information out of the reports that he can conduct his breeding, feeding and marketing operations a little more intelligently in the future, and therefore more profitably than in the past.

Market reports are history, and the chief value of history is the basis which it provides on which to forecast the future. In other words, what has happened in the past will probably occur again under the same or similar circumstances. Small benefit is generally derived from reading a single market report, or one covering a short period of time. Markets move in cycles, and the man who would keep informed must follow them diligently in season and out. This is a matter of particular importance to the stockman, because his business is, to an unusual degree, a long-time speculation. He must prepare now and lay his plans today in light of what he thinks the market will be anywhere from six months to two years hence. But how will the department's reports assist him in doing this?

First of all, he should take into account potential supplies of the particular class of live stock in which he is interested. Assume that cattle is his line. The monthly report, Stock at Stockyards, gives the number of cattle and calves marketed from month to month through 68 central markets. If such movements are unusually heavy for any considerable time, it may indicate a cattle shortage during the next year or two, and a shortage of any commodity usually means higher prices.

This same report also shows the number of cattle and calves that went back to the country as stockers and feeders. If such movements were exceptionally light, it would help to confirm the belief that a comparative shortage in cattle was impending. On the other hand, heavy stocker and feeder shipments would go a long way toward neutralizing the importance of

the heavy receipts, for the stockman would know that most of these cattle going back to the country must be returned to market during the next few weeks or months and enter consumption channels.

Having established in this fashion a broad basis for his operations, let us assume the stockman is feeding a lot of steers for the market. He must now give market reports more careful and persistent attention than before. It is quite important that he know what kind of cattle are in best demand on the principal markets. If there is a steady inquiry for heavy finished cattle, and that kind are selling at a premium over lighter weights, it will probably pay him to "feed his cattle out," unless the cost of feed is exceptionally high.

If, however, consumptive demand seems to be drifting steadily toward lighter retail cuts of meat, or because of general business depression or some other cause, is centering chiefly on the lower and cheaper grades, he may find it more profitable to market his cattle at an earlier age and before they have attained great weight.

Abundant information along this line will be found both in the live stock market reports and the reports dealing with meat-trade conditions in the large consuming centers. In this connection the stockman will also be interested in keeping advised as to whether the slaughter of meat is increasing or decreasing and whether the movement applies equally to all classes of meat, or whether slaughter of beef is decreasing while that of some other class is increasing. This information is obtainable from the statistical report covering the live stock and meat situation, which is based on the federal meat-inspection reports of the bureau of animal industry and is also published monthly by the bureau of markets.
