### Council Proceedings.

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held on Monday evening with all members present and Mayor Van Vactor presiding.

The following claims against the city were audited and ordered to be paid:

Martin Reid, lumber, \$3.36; Gilliam & Babes, supplies, \$89; A. G. Long, fire apparatus, \$495.00; Mack Smith, salary, \$75.00; Mack Smith, sawing wood and cleaning pest house, \$2.00; J. P. Williams, salary, \$18.65; L. W. Briggs, salary, \$3.63; H. L. & W. Co., current, \$99.60; Gus Wilcox, work with team, \$3.50; Jas. Elder, work with team, \$3.00; Thos. Brennan, spanners, \$3.00; Henry Beglow, labor, \$5.50; Chas. Williams, labor, \$1.25; Mrs. Della Halluck, caring for patient at pest house, \$125.00.

Various committees were appointed by the mayor to look after the interests of the city, and decisive action was taken with reference to the holding of any public gathering in the Club building until such a time as it is placed in proper shape. Much discussion of various subjects was entered into, especially the matter of the future action of the city concerning the water and light situation. This is a problem that is coming on for settlement soon and requires the earnest consideration of the council, as well as every citizen of Heppner. The improvement of our streets and alleys and the general cleaning up of the town and beautifying of its thoroughfares is also receiving attention, as well as the sanitary conditions, and the mayor has mapped out sufficient work for the city fathers to keep them on the move during their term of office.

In dealing with the question of the houses of ill repute within the city, the council decided to refuse to take any revenue whatever from this source and the law will be allowed to take its course with reference to this class.

### Much Done, Little Said.

It is a safe proposition that any reasonably intelligent man who without prejudice, will examine the achievements of the Taft administration in the direction of procuring reasonable tariff revision will be compelled by the facts to give his cordial approval to the Taft policy. But how many have followed the determined and successful effort of the president to secure a tariff board and to procure from congress the funds necessary to develop the facts?

Had not the impatient members of the community entrusted the control of the house to the Democrats, concrete result of President Taft's achievements in this direction would already have been written on the statutes. With a Democratic house and a Republican senate it may be that no tariff legislation will be enacted at this session but if there is not, it will be solely because the Democrats are unwilling to father a revision in accordance with the findings of the tariff board.

And yet it is argued, and with reason, that even those who espouse the Democratic view that there should be a wholesale slashing of the tariff will gain the end they wish more certainly and more expeditiously by the Taft method than that of Mr. Underwood and his colleagues in the house, for it is pointed out that were the Democrats in control of the three branches of government, and were they to pass such legislation as they have put through the house, there would inevitably follow another reaction, precisely like that which followed the enactment of the Wilson bill, and another Dingley bill would be the result.

If, on the contrary, the revision of the tariff is effected slowly and systematically, every step being supported by a report of the tariff board showing the reasons therefor, such revision will not cause a reaction, but will stand until the tariff board shows that still further reductions should be made.

Will an administration stand stronger before the country if every achievement is thoroughly and forcefully advertised when it becomes a fact and that advertising is kept up from inauguration to election or do American people prefer to do their own thinking, only to be reminded of the achievement of their public servants when a campaign is approaching?

This is one of the questions friends of President Taft's administration are seriously asking themselves. Those who have taken occasion recently to examine the records of this administration are themselves surprised to discover how much has been accomplished and how little has been said about it.

Of course in the approaching campaign, the record will figure largely in the Republican text-book and will be proclaimed from the political stump, but has not the Taft administration suffered because he has proceeded so quietly and blown its own trumpet so little?—Salem Statesman.
