The life boat capacity on these ships has always been sufficient to accommodate all of the passengers and crew and the wireless equipment is such that the wireless room at a times night and day, is in charge of an experienced operator. Notices are posted in all state rooms, public rooms and staterage showing the assignments of occupants to specific boats, and all life-boats are conspicuously numbered. Fire and boat drills are held at each port as well as on the first day out and passengers are invited to take part in them. Stewards demonstrate how to attach life-belts to the body. It is said that these are not new rulings, but have been in force on these ships for several years.
