**Gielse Accident Nearly Costs Life.**  
While hauling hay Wednesday for the C. S. McNaught Co., H. B. Gielse met with an accident that will cripple him for several months. He had loaded his wagon with baled hay at the McNaught field and started to town. Just as he turned into the road and started down the hill two bales in front rolled off, taking Harry with them. The hay fell onto the horses, causing them to run. Gielse fell in front of the wheels which passed over his left heel and foot and right limb between the knee and ankle.

Some of the bones of the foot were broken and in addition there is a deep cut which has the appearance of a hook having entered and then torn out. One bone of the limb was broken and there was a bad cut on it, too. How the cuts were made has not been explained and Mr. Gielse has no idea how it happened. The accident was witnessed by men working nearby and Dr. Wainwright was summoned immediately and dressed the wounds. While the hurts were painful Wednesday, Mr. Gielse is resting fairly comfortable now.—Hermiston Herald.

**Disastrous Fire at Athena.**  
Athena, Ore., Sept. 30.—Athena had another disastrous fire last evening. Starting in the back end of the garage of the Allen Auto Co., it destroyed the garage and the Mosgrove storeroom adjoining and threatened for a time to spread through all of the buildings on the south side of the street. The fire broke out about 6 o'clock in the evening. Mr. Allen was vulcanizing a tire in the rear room of his garage when a customer came in for gasoline. After entering the charge, he went back to discover the whole rear room in flames. The loss on the garage was about \$1800 and was partially covered by \$500 insurance. A Studebaker auto and motorcycle inside were burned. The loss in the burning of the storeroom was about \$200 and the contents destroyed were valued at \$1200. There was a \$400 policy on the contents.—Pendleton E. O.

**Prepare For Hard Winter.**  
The Indians have all manner of traditions and superstitions for forecasting the weather and with the judicious use of the most applicable of them manage usually to make a pretty accurate forecast of the approaching season. The only unpleasant feature is that these forecasts are not always to be relied on until the weather has come. The red man has some of that same tendency toward a change of mind that has been exhibited in recent years by the chief executive of the national government. As an instance: Early in the summer the Indians of this section of the country made the forecast that the coming winter would be a mild one because of the small number of flies and insects to be found in the woods. They pointed out that last fall the insects were busy gathering supplies for the hard winter to come and that they were to be seen in great numbers. This spring, the insects were few and the Indians said that they were taking advantage of the fact that it would not be necessary this year to gather a large supply of winter food for the winter would be brief. Lately, however, something has impelled the native to change his mind and a hard winter is the latest forecast. the trees are heavy with moss—both have acquired protections against the rigors of the cold weather. So, the ordinary citizen, unequipped with any manner of forecasting for himself except with the use of the Family Almanac, has some difficulty in determining just how much coal to order for the winter supply. As a matter of fact, the Indian is inclined to look backward rather than forward in making his predictions. For instance, he remembers that before last winter there were lots of bugs in evidence. Last winter was hard so he decides that the presence of so many insects is the forerunner of a hard winter. If he looked at it in another way, he would probably see that the reason for the scarcity of bugs this spring was that they had all been killed off by the rigorous weather and the reason for their appearance in numbers the previous winter was that there had not been any weather hard enough to kill them for several years. So it is with the predictions based on the portly bear and moss covered trees. The berries have been plentiful in the forests this year and consequently, the bears have fared well and will go through the winter in fine shape. The unusually wet weather of the winter and spring, which lasted even well into the beginning of summer, together with the mild summer which followed, has naturally resulted in the unusual growth of moss on the tree trunks. The Indian's prophecy is sometimes correct but the reason for this is rather that the weather comes by cycles and a mild winter or spring is to be followed by a severe winter, or the opposite condition may be found.—Pendleton Tribune.
