## BUSINESS BOOMS AT SPRAY PLANT

The spray plant of the J. C. Butcher Co. on Railroad avenue just west of the packing plant of the Consolidated Mercantile Co., has been one of the busiest places in Hood River during the past several weeks. While a large amount of miscible oil spray was turned out at the new factory, for the past week or more the crew has been busy making lime-sulphur solution. An average of 75 barrels per day has been manufactured. Except on a few days the demand has been as great as, or greater than the output. Spray dealers have simply taken orders and have sent the purchasers direct to the factory.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Butcher are busy daily at the plant, the latter assisting by taking care of the books and clerical work.

### Alfalfa Feed Hogs No Good





## SINNOT WORKS FOR NITRATE PLANT

Representative Sinnott, of Oregon, has introduced a bill in the house appropriating \$10,000 for an investigation by army engineers of the power possibilities at Celilo Falls, on the Columbia river in Oregon, and the practicability of establishing there a great plan for the production of nitrates.

These plans have much interest in the subject of nitrate production at this season, and congress is being educated in this need more at this time than ever before. This comes in large part from the war situation, which has brought home the difficulties that would be encountered in the event of war in securing an adequate supply of powder and explosives.

The nitrate plant idea has a commercial side also, as it would be to supply immense quantities of fertilizer and by affecting reduction in fertilizer prices tend to promote agriculture.

Witnesses who have testified before committees of congress on the subject have mentioned three locations where power could be developed in such quantity and under such conditions as to stand first in the field for consideration. There are Mussel Shoals, on the Tennessee river in Alabama; Priest Rapids on the Columbia in Washington, and the Celilo project on the Columbia in Oregon.

## CHAUTAQUA DATES HAVE BEEN SET

Dates for the fifth annual Hood River chautauq have been set for July 5-10, inclusive. The chautauq for the first two years after organization was held in a natural park near the Lava beds in the Upper Hood River valley. For the past two years they have been conducted at an open air theatre erected in a maple grove in a city park.

The programs of the chautauq of the coming year will be held at the open air theatre. And everything will be given according to schedule, rain or shine, for provisions have been made to stretch a canvas over the theatre, which seats 1200, if the weather is inclement.

Instead of the usual home talent shows, the entertainment this year will be provided by the Ellison-White Chautauq circuit.

## Ammunition Mailed, Trouble Follows

The box, alleged to have contained a shot gun and ammunition, which was shipped by parcel post from this city to Rev. W. S. Nichol at Winlock, Wash., was delivered to the local post office by Mrs. M. C. Coons, the mother-in-law of Nichol, who is reported to have sent for the gun following trouble in which he had become involved following alleged bitter personalities with respect to certain Winlock residents. The evangelist, known here as Dr. Nichol, was formerly engaged in the drug business and later in real estate transactions.

"I had a letter from Dr. Nichol," says Mrs. Coons, "and he merely instructed me to send the gun, which was already boxed. I did not make any investigation, but shipped the box, already nailed up, as instructed. If there was any ammunition in the box I didn't know anything about it. I don't think anything will come of the matter; if there is, Nichol will be responsible for it."

## Cherry Seeds Said to be Valuable

Sixteen hundred tons of cherry pits, now a source of annoyance and expense to canneries, can be made to yield two valuable oils and also a meal for feeding cattle, according to specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. In addition 105,000 gallons of cherry juice now wasted in seedling cherries can be turned into desirable jelly and syrup, or even into alcohol. A saving of these valuable by-products from cherry canning may make possible the domestic manufacture of substitutes for almond oil and bitter almond oil, now imported, and at the same time establish a new industry in the cherry packing districts of the North Atlantic, North Central and Western states.

## Scenery Delights Mrs. Weister

The scenery along the Columbia river highway and in the vicinity of Mitchell's Point proved the delight of Mrs. Alice Weister, of Portland, who was here last week to deliver an address on art to the members of the evening department of the women's club.

Mrs. Weister, who has lived in Switzerland, says that the Mitchell's Point tunnel excels in beauty the famed Axenstrasse tunnel of the Swiss Alps.

## Exchange Sells Last Apples

The Fruit Growers Exchange last Friday cleaned its warehouse of the last apples of the 1916 crop, shipping the remainder of its stock, which consisted of cooking Newtons, to Portland. The shipping agency has closed its pools, except on Newtons, returns for some of which variety are not all in.

## Hot Iron Causes Fire

## UNDERWOOD FOLK GET IRRIGATION

Geo. R. Wilbur and Jas. H. Hazlett have completed the organization of an irrigation district, the system of which will cover 800 acres of developed orchard land of the following growers in the Underwood district: F. I. Packard, G. A. Cooper, W. H. Rine, H. C. Lowden, G. E. Hussey, Lizzie C. Packard, Jennie Cooper, Louis Thum, S. C. Clark, Sarah A. Hedrick and Edmond C. Goddard. The members of the new district have filed on water sufficient for their project in the White Salmon river a short distance below the power plant of the Northwestern Electric Co.

The river water will be lifted by an unique manner from the river bed for a distance of 200 feet to the highest point of the area covered. A pump, operated by the river's waters conveyed in a flume, will have a capacity of 1,000 gallons per minute. The approximate total cost of the system will reach \$40,000 or \$50 per acre.

## WHITE SALMON WINS SUNDAY'S BALL GAME

White Salmon won Sunday's baseball game with the team of this city by a score of 3 to 1, despite the good work done by March Morris, the local's new pitcher. Ed Ford, hitting rookie, made on Morris, who showed up in fine form. The Hood River team secured 10 hits.

The Hood River lineup was as follows: Mall Button, catcher; Morris, pitcher; Carl; W. J. Baker, 2b; Hale, 3b; Thomas, short; Edgar Franz and Ford, left field; Baxter and Stockton, center; and Tauesher and Pickens, right.

The Hood River team will meet the O. W. R. N. team of Portland, next Sunday. The local boys will do some practice work, in order to secure better team work, and the game with the crack aggregation from Portland should be an interesting one.

## J. M. LEDFORD NOW SEEKS SHRIEVALTY

Hood River county now has three republican aspirants for the office of sheriff—Thos. F. Johnson, incumbent, who is serving his third successive term; T. J. Kinnaird, a former merchant, and J. M. Ledford, a Belmont rancher.

Mr. Ledford, the most recent candidate, is a native son, having been born in Wasco county, where for four years he was a deputy sheriff and for eight years a constable.

"If nominated and elected," says Mr. Ledford, "I pledge myself to discharge the duties of the office for the best interest of the taxpayers. I believe in absolute law enforcement."

## East Fork Case Again Argued

George R. Wilbur, secretary and attorney of the East Fork Irrigation district, returned last week from Salem, where he had been to argue before the supreme court the case of the Oregon Lumber Co. against the irrigation district, since case having to be appealed from a decision of Judge Bradshaw in the circuit court. The case was recently argued before the supreme court, but a rehearing was ordered before the justices en banc, several members of the court having been absent at the time of the first argument.

## Dwinnell Gets Divorce

A decision was received here last week from Judge Bradshaw, of the Dalles, granting to Frank H. Dwinnell, a West Side orchardist, an unconditional divorce from Lulu G. Dwinnell. The couple was married here five years ago. Mr. Dwinnell in his complaint alleged cruel and inhuman treatment.

## Home Asparagus Sold

Home grown asparagus is now being sold by dealers in sprouts having been grown at the truck gardens of J. H. Koberg and F. H. Button. Within a few days the local producers will be shipping "the grass" in heavy export quantities to Portland and Seattle.

## Berry Crop Will be Late

The strawberry crop of the Hood River valley, which will reach upwards of 150 carloads this season, will be two weeks later, at least, than last year, when shipments were being made by the middle of May. Berry tracts were beginning to bloom in the most protected districts early in April last season. Conditions now show that the bloom will begin two weeks later this season.
