 The largest nursery in the Northwest, the Washington Nursery Company, represented here by J. B. Lister, reported Monday: "All stock is very scarce and we find it practically impossible to purchase stock elsewhere."
 Recent similar reports have come to Mr. Lister from the largest Oregon nurseries.
 At present there are no restrictions on Bose or d'Anjou pears or Ortley and other standard varieties of apples in the valley. Delicious apples and Bing or Lambert cherries are limited to small purchases.
 Some deferred last year thinking prices would decline. Instead they advanced 20 per cent. It is probable trees will go to \$1 straight next year. Those who delay buying will lose three years.
