The Yazoo River is rising slowly, produced by heavy rains that have fallen above this point.

Fire.—A very destructive fire occurred in our town on Monday morning last. It originated at about 2 o'clock, in J. Reilly's Blacksmith and Carriage Shop, and the flames were not arrested until they had entirely consumed these buildings, together with the store house occupied by M. B. Wolfe, the saddle and harness shop of H. E. Miller, the residence and shoe shop of Peter Lander, and Engine house No. 1. Peter Lander saved nothing but his tools; M. B. Wolfe nothing scarcely; J. Reilly lost everything. H. E. Miller saved most of his stock.

The two Fire Companies rendered efficient service in stopping the fire. If it had not been for their efforts, the fire would have spread across the street, and immense damage would have been done.

The suspicious circumstances under which the fire took place, together with the fire last week, has produced the impression that there are a set of villains prowling about our town for the purpose of burning houses and robbing and plundering, and our citizens have organized themselves into a sort of vigilance committee, and six are detailed every night to patrol the town. If the suspicions are well founded, we hope the scoundrels will be caught and properly dealt with.

We are pleased to learn that Prof. Merrill will, in a few days, return to our city, and finish his canvass for the New American Encyclopedia and Benton's Abridgement of Congressional Debates. These works need no comment. They speak for themselves; and when we mention the fact that about thirty of our best citizens have already subscribed for the Cyclopaedia, we have said enough to satisfy all of its great value.

Marshall county subscribed for one hundred sets; Lafayette and Yalobusha about fifty sets each. Cannot our county give a larger subscription than either, to this great work? She has made a good beginning. Prof. M. took fourteen subscriptions in one day. He will call upon our citizens again next week.

Ex-Governor Hunt, of New York, Mr. Bell's principal supporter in that State, has been writing some pretty sharp letters to Horace Greeley, who had attacked him on account of his favoring the movement to coalesce with the Douglasites. Here is what Mr. Hunt says of Mr. Bell, in defending him against the accusation of pro-slavery opinions: "You now pretend that Mr. Bell is an objectionable as Mr. Breckinridge. How is it possible that you can say this? What did you mean by the felicitous alliteration, in your widely circulated journal, or 'Bell, Bates or Botta,' as proper candidate—repeated, if I mistake not, in your celebrated speech at Osawatimie, in the very heart of Kansas? More than once within a twelve-month you have placed the name of Mr. Bell among those whom you would be willing to accept, as a compromise candidate to unite the Opposition.
