

The State Fair at Yakima this year promises to be the best ever held. In all the departments there will be special features that will surpass anything attempted in previous years, and in every branch of the institution new methods of exhibits will be noticeable. The Board of Commissioners are now putting in a good deal of work getting things in shape for the big event, and nothing will be left undone that will likely bring success. Owing to the fact that but little expense was necessary on the grounds this year, as was the case last, better premiums have been offered in every department. This alone will insure a good exhibit from all parts of the state.

It is in the live stock department where the most noticeable change will be. Applications for stalls are now coming in rapidly and from indications it looks as though there will be triple the display over that of last year. Beef and dairy breeds of cattle will predominate among the live stock, while draft horses and roadsters will be well represented, with Washington, Oregon and British Columbia competing for the good prizes.

Among the big herds to be exhibited will be one from the John Sparks famous Alamo ranch at Reno, Nevada. He will place on exhibition here the finest lot of Herefords ever seen in the state; and among the Red Polled breeders will be S. A. Converse, of Creese, Iowa; Frank Brown, of North Yamhill, and W. O. Wilmer, of Heppner, Oregon, will exhibit Short-horns; F. A. French, of Portland, will have a herd of Brown Swiss in the stalls, and Frank Padget, recently of Missouri, but now of North Yakima, will have for the first time in the history of the fair, a fine herd of Aberdeen-Angus cattle on exhibition. Among the Jersey stock exhibitors, will be T. F. Griffith, of Spokane; J. L. Smith, Spokane; Fechter & Janeck, North Yakima; D. H. Looney, Jefferson, Oregon. F. E. McEldowney, of Portland, will make a combination exhibit of Jerseys, Guernseys and Berkshire pigs, and J. E. Shannon, of North Yakima, will have a combination exhibit of Polled Durhams and Jerseys. There will also be a number of other stock exhibitors.


