ANOTHER BATTLE

On Cuban Coast.

A Sharp Skirmish.

Off SANTIAGO, Friday June 17.—(On board the Associated Press boat Wanda)—A sharp brush between the Spanish troops and a reconnoitering party occurred at daylight this morning, in a small cove west of Morro Castle. The Massachusetts cutter in charge of the Harlow entered the cove to take soundings and reconnoiter.

When well inside the cove a detachment of infantry fired from a blockhouse.

The fire was vigorously returned by the marines in the cutter and also by the men from the New York cutter.

The latter cutter was hit ten times and the marine Massachusetts cutter had a stock of rifles battered but by great good luck no one was hit.

The Texas fired a six-pounder on the hillside the cove assailing the blockhouse with rapid fire. The Spanish retreated to the woods.

The Yankee arrived today and reports an engagement with a Spanish gumbot Monday off Cienfuegos.

The Spaniards retreated into the harbor, firing as they went.

A shell burst over the Yankee and some of the fragments struck landsman Kennedy of the New York, who received a severe flesh wound, but will recover.

The naval reserves who manned the Yankee fought well.

Cuban Dissensions.

MADRID, June 18.—A Havana dispatch to a semi-official paper says that general credence is attached to the report that there are serious dissensions which have broken out among the rebel leaders, some insisting upon remaining neutral while others are preparing to fight the Americans from fear of annexation and American tyranny.

A number of alleged documents have been published as coming from Maximilian Gomez to the Cuban Junta protesting against the intervention of the United States.

Troops Named.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18.—General Merritt has issued orders designating the troops which are to make up the third Philippine expedition under General King.

There are two battalions of Idaho volunteers, 13th Minnesota regiment of Volunteers, two battalions from North Dakota; 6th California, Wyoming battalions of volunteers, and two battalions of the regular artillery. They will start not later than the last of next week.

In Favor of Peace.

MADRID, June 18.—There is considerable comment here today over a long conference that has just occurred between the British ambassador to Spain and the Spanish minister of war.

The newspapers of this city today publish the text of the manifesto from the inhabitants of Catalonia, of which Barcelona is the capital, in favor of peace between Spain and the United States.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—It begins to look now as if the war department might have difficulty in obtaining transports for the expedition to Porto Rico, unless some of those sent to Santiago are utilized.

An earnest appeal has been made to the Coastwise steamship companies to assist the government but most of all of them have already given their best ships and cannot do more without great loss. In the dilemma the department has been obliged to resort to ships of a foreign register.

CHANGES CONTEMPLATED.

For some time past the school commissioners have been thinking very strongly of adding a number of studies to the high school course, that the scholars might be better prepared when taking the entrance examinations into college. The colleges are requiring a higher average when entering, and the high school has got to meet the requirements.

Superintendent of Schools O. D. Mathewson said the other day that higher algebra would be added to the course beginning next term, solid geometry, plain trigonometry, additional work in French and either chemistry or physics.

One more grade will have to be established and the services of another teacher will be required. The students in the first and second years will be the same as at present but the last two will be entirely different.

These changes will be a good thing for the school and after taking the new course the scholar will be enabled to enter college more easily.

WHO WILL GET THE CUP?

That's what Goddards are thinking about now that Montpelier has forfeited the St. Albans-Montpelier ball game, which was to have been played yesterday, to St. Albans, this put St. Albans in the lead. This is another of Montpelier's baby acts and the Goddard intend to protest against St. Albans getting the cup Captain Ayer has written a letter to St. Johnsbury asking them to protest with Goddard against St. Albans. It is understood St. Albans claims the cup. Burlington also forfeited their last game to Montpelier.

The stand that Goddards takes is, that as Montpelier and Burlington refused to play the remaining game, all should be struck out in the standing. This would leave St. Albans Goddard and St. Johnsbury tied for first place. Captain Ayer will probably hear something definite in a few days.
