IS STILL ALIVE

ter back. It was impossible to remove the man from the grounds as the mob outside threatened his life. It was not known at the time if the President was mortally wounded.

With remarkable fortitude the President closed his lips and his head fell back, but he never lost courage. Finally he became so faint it was necessary to support his head while his eyes closed.

The officers closed on the assassin and a deputy marshal secured handkerchief and revolver he had concealed in his hand. Thousands cried, men actually took off their hats and wept like babies, as the President was carried away. Women cried. After the shooting mounted police were called and formed an escort to the ambulance which carried the President to the hospital. Dr. Carr was the first doctor on the scene. After an examination he said the wounds were not necessarily fatal. The assassin was kept in the secret room in the Temple, before which the shooting occurred. It was not safe to remove him as 10,000 people clamored for his blood. Gathered about were fully 100,000 people. The physician's examination showed one wound in the center of the chest on the left side which was very painful. Secretary Cortelyou was by the President's side and asked, "are your wounds painful?" "This one is," pointing to the one in his chest, McKinley replied. The shooting occurred a few minutes after 4 o'clock, at the Temple of Music where a reception had been in progress five minutes.

At 5:20 the physicians attending the president stated that they had succeeded in removing one bullet. McKinley bears up well under the terrible suffering.

Nieman the assassin was taken to police headquarters where he arrived at 6 o'clock. He was lodged in the cell known as the "black pit."

An examination by the physicians shows one wound in the breast and the second in the groin on the left side.

President McKinley is conscious and resting easily. The second bullet has been successfully removed. When Nieman was taken to jail the mob attempted to take his life. The President was resting comfortably at 7:30.

Immediately the President was cared for at the exposition grounds, Director General Buchanan started for the Milburn residence to forestall any information that might reach there by telephone or otherwise. Very luckily he was first there with the information. The Niagara Falls trip had tired Mrs. McKinley and she took leave of her nieces, the Misses Barber, Miss Duncan, as well as their hostess Mrs. Milburn, and went to her room to rest.

Mr. Buchanan broke the news as gently as possible to the nieces and consulted Mrs. Milburn as to the best means of breaking the news to Mrs. McKinley.

At 7:20 o'clock Dr. Rixey came out of the house accompanied by Col. Webb Hayes, son of Ex-President Hayes who is a friend of President McKinley. They entered a carriage and returned to the exposition hospital.

After Dr. Rixey had gone Mr. Buchanan said that the doctor had broken the news in a gentle way to Mrs. McKinley. He said she stood it bravely though considerably affected. It was possible to bring him to her she wanted it done.

Washington, Sept. 7.—Vice President Roosevelt of course will hold himself in readiness to do whatever is necessary to meet the obligations imposed upon the Vice President by the constitution of the United States.

Should the worst come it is realized that important changes in the public affairs of the country would soon be brought about. Whether there would be an extra session of Congress is open to question but there seems no doubt that an extra session of the Senate would be essential as an incident to a change of administration.

All this has been thought of here

only in the vaguest manner and confidence is almost universal here, based on the President's magnificent constitution, his present health and the tremendous stride that has been made since Garfield's time in surgery that there will be no occasion to resort to the constitutional provision made to meet the demise of a president in office.

Boston Sept. 6.—Richard Olney, Congressman Conroy and other democrats express great grief at the shooting. The republicans including chairman Goetting of state committee are much shocked. Excitement on the streets is intense.

Boston, Sept. 6.—The announcement of the attempted lynching of Nieman created a small riot for the President. Hats were waved and cheers sounded.

ISLE LA MOTTE, VT., Sept. 6 Special.—The announcement of the attempted assassination of President McKinley brought consternation to the members and guests of the Fish and Game League who were entertaining Vice-President Roosevelt, this afternoon. Roosevelt made hasty preparations for his departure as soon as he heard the sad news.

Washington Sept. 7.—The Publishers Press first announced the shooting of President McKinley here. At the White House all faces were blanched. In the capitol men bent their heads in reverence. The diplomatic corps now in the city is deeply grieved.

New York Sept. 7.—The excitement here is intense. People cry for the death of the assassin.

THE NEWS IN BARRE.

The news of the attempted assassination of President McKinley first reached Barre about 5:30 last night, by telephone.

At first every one thought it was a hoax, but other messages began to arrive and soon the press associations began to telegraph the particulars.

On account of inadequate press facilities and also on account of our forms

being taken down, the TELEGRAM management decided not to try to get out an extra until this morning when fuller particulars could be had, but our bulletin at the Red Cross Pharmacy was the first public announcement of the shooting made in Barre.

WENT FAST

The TELEGRAM issued an extra at 7 o'clock this morning, and in a short time the whole edition of 1500 copies had been disposed of and there were calls for many more, but on account of our regular editions which tax our present press facilities to the utmost we were unable to issue any more extras. Our regular editions today contain all the latest obtainable news of the attempted assassination of President McKinley.

McKeesport, Sept. 6.—The following notice was issued this noon to the employees of the United Steel Works of the American tin plate company: "You are hereby notified that this mill has resumed operations, and no former employes wishing to return must report not later than Monday next or their places will be filled with other workers." L. E. Lauk, supt."




