Fort Muenro, Va., Apr. 26.—The transport Panther with 800 men escorted by the Montgomery left this noon for Key West.

Washington, Apr. 26.—The war revenue bill was reported to the House at noon.

Mass. National Guard to Guard the Coast.

Highland Light, Apr. 26 The Cruiser Minneapolis passed here at seven o'clock this morning apparently bound for Boston.

Bernabe in Toronto.

London, Apr. 26.—The government will be questioned today in the House of Commons as to whether Bernabe is at liberty to use Toronto as a base for supplying information to Spain against the United States.

Falmouth, Apr. 26.—The torpedo boat Somers has been notified in view of the neutrality measures that the must not leave port, and a British torpedo boat has taken up a position near her.

England Neutral.

London, Apr. 26.—A naval decree was printed this morning in the London Gazette, proclaiming that Great Britain would remain neutral.

Massachusetts Artillery to Man Fort Warren.

Boston, Apr. 26.—The first regiment of heavy artillery in the Massachusetts volunteer militia were reviewed here by the Governor and the Mayor at noon today while the regiment was on the march to Fort Warren where they will be stationed for the present.

France Neutral.

Paris, Apr. 26.—The French government today approved the neutrality proclamation.

Morro Castle Did Not Fire.

Washington, Apr. 26.—Secretary Long at 11 o'clock today authorized an emphatic denial of the report that advances have been received stating that Morro Castle had fired upon our fleet and that our ships responded.

Trouble in Manila.

Hong Kong, Apr. 26.—The United States consulate from Manila, arrived here today. They left Manila Saturday, at which time the insurgents were missing around the country and a massacre of the Spaniards was apprehended.

Gov. Grout Notified.

Washington, Apr. 26.—Secretary Alger notified Governor Grout last night that the quota of men that would be called for from Vermont would be a full regiment. This means the 1200 men.

Want the Call Changed.

Hartford Conn., Apr. 26.—The volunteers call causes difficulty here. There are no batteries in the Connecticut Militia.

Spanish War Ships Not Needed.

Havana, via London, Apr. 26.—Gen. Banes has notified the government in Madrid that he can defend Havana without the aid of Spanish warships.

Another Capture.

Cambridge, Apr. 26.—Norton of Harvard today advised the students not to enlist. He said the patriot call for them was to stay at home, and devote their time to advancing civilization.

The Ireland Held.

Kingston, Apr. 26.—The mail steamer Ireland which is said to have been purchased by the United States has been forbidden to sail on account of the neutrality.

The Columbia Sails.

Newport, Apr. 26.—The cruiser Columbia sailed this morning destination unknown.

Day Secretary of State.

Washington, Apr. 26.—The President today nominated Day Secretary of State, vice Sherman, and John B. Moore of New York was nominated assistant secretary.

New Hampshire one Reg't.

Concord, Apr. 26.—Gov. Ramsdell has designated the third regiment of the National Guard as the regiment to answer the President's call for volunteers.

To Save Our Rights.

Washington, Apr. 26.—The state department has sent all foreign nations notice of the declaration of war which took effect April 21. This was done to save our rights.

Want Their Own Colonel.

Springfield, Ill., Apr. 26.—John A. Logan's determination to command the regiment of cavalry from Illinois has delayed the official call for troops several hours.

Two More Prizes.

Key West, Apr. 26.—The gunboat Newport has just brought in two more prizes captured this morning.

Spanish Fleet Will Sail At Once.

Madrid, Apr. 26.—It is rumored here that the Spanish Admiral, S. Valdes, is about to sail with a fleet of 12 vessels, unless he is sent to the United States fleet today.

Most of the States Prompt.

Washington, Apr. 26.—Most of the governments have made prompt and gratifying reports to the call for volunteers.

Boston Harbor Closed.

Boston, Apr. 26.—The harbor will be closed to all ships between sunset and sunrise from now on.
