Northfield, Mass., Wants Trolley.

The Greenfield Recorder says: "William M. Moore of Northfield, one of the town's most enterprising citizens, has been in conference with some of the officers of the Connecticut Valley street railway in regard to the building of a line to Northfield. He has circulated a petition in the town and nearly all the people have signed it. Mr. Moore states that he could find only eight men who would not subscribe. The Millers Falls trolley is believed to have slumped beyond rescue and the line from Greenfield is wanted.

The situation is not as favorable from the standpoint of the Connecticut Valley company as it was with the Greenfield and Turners Falls. The consolidation with the lines down the valley has given the company about all the business it can well care for at present and it is doubtful if this company will undertake the extension. The foundation of a new company is the possible solution."
