CABOT, COUPLE BEEN MARRIED NEARLY 66 YEARS

CABOT, Aug. 19.—On Sept. 17, 1919, Mr. and Mrs. J. Gilbert Hill of Cabot, Vt., aged respectively 90 and 87 years, will enjoy the unusual privilege of observing their 66th wedding anniversary. They are a remarkably well preserved couple and each has an interesting family history.

Mr. Hill's parents and grandparents were natives of New Hampshire, his father of Gilmanton and his mother of Moultonboro.

In 1828 they located on Government land at Barre, Que., where their son Gilbert was born Sept. 18, 1829, and where he lived until 12 years of age, when his parents came back to Vermont, N. H., where they spent the remainder of their lives.

When 24 years of age, Gilbert was married to Sabrina M. Duran of Cabot at Westworth, N. H., Rev. Isaac S. Davis. They lived on a farm in Westworth, Vt., and were a traveling salesman for four years in Vermont, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New York and Canada.

The Civil War put a stop to his line of business and he bought a farm in Calais where he lived four years, then went to Cabot to the farm where he has lived for nearly 44 years.

During Mr. Hill's days as traveling salesman, Mrs. Hill did dressmaking at Cabot and Worcester. They had four sons, the oldest living only 18 months, and the third only to the age of 33 years. The second son is a prosperous farmer in Hardwick, and the youngest lives with his parents.

Mrs. Hill's father, Darius Duran, was born at Cabot Plains, in 1806. When a young man he married Prudence Pure and cleared a place on Mollys Pond in Cabot, built a log house and settled there, where their son, Alvin Duran, aged 80 years, lives, hale and hearty.

They had 10 children. One son was drowned in Mollys Pond at the age of 21; one went to California at the age of 25, married and died there; another son went West, but returned to Cabot and died a few years later; a daughter, Cora, married and went to Piermont, N. H., and later to Lowell; Sabina is the wife of Mr. Hill and was 85 years old on June 14, 1919.

Mary went at the age of three years to live with an aunt, was three times married, her last to Darwin Miller of 24 Pearl street, St. Johnsbury, where she has spent most of her life; she died in Worcester and married Edward Folsom, later going to Ashland, Neb., where they still live; Jennie died at the age of two years and on the same day a brother died from scarlet fever and both were buried in the same grave.

Mr. and Mrs. Hill live on the farm adjoining the Duran homestead. Mrs. Hill is somewhat feeble, but although Mr. Hill's physical health is somewhat impaired his mental faculties are wonderfully preserved.
