Senator Harding Leads With 404

 "endum" upon the League of Nations was impressive. In the absence of final figures, the swelling tide of huge pluralities early today gave him the assurance of 320 votes in the electoral college as against 127 for Cox, with 75 doubtful inclusive of states where the Republican tide was running strong. The unofficial result procured a large majority in the electoral college for Harding and his running-mate Coolidge of Massachusetts than any since 1888, except alone the vote of 435 for Wilson in 1912, during the Republican split. The Republican congressional swing was as strong, increased majorities in both Senate and House being marked up early today. Victory for virtually all of the 15 Republican senators up for reelection was spelled by the returns while about a half dozen of the 19 Democratic candidates were battling against Republican leads.

The first trial of woman suffrage contributed largely to the Republican majorities and was a factor in delaying the count in many states. Senator Harding accepted his victory without exultation stating that he was "more given to prayer to God to make me capable of playing my part." To Governor Coolidge, the next vice-president, he sent a message stating "We've got a real job and we'll tackle it together." Governor Cox also received his defeat without untoward show of feeling. He withheld any comment after remaining at his newspaper office at Darton until almost midnight and seeing his own paper issue an early recounting his defeat. Senator Harding, with the receipt of the ballot tidings on his 55th birthday announced plans for a vacation beginning next Friday. He will spend several days near Brownsville, Texas and then tour the Panama Canal zone. Governor Cox is planning a vacation on a hunting trip in Mississippi. In California where Senator Phenix, Democrat, was trailing far behind Samuel H. Hays, Republican, and with Senator Harding eyeing the state ahead of the ticket, adoption of the Alien Land Law amendment relative to the Japanese land tenure had a wide majority. Of the Democrats, Senator Underwood of Alabama, minority leader, was reelected. Comparative few changes in committee chairmanship are expected to result in either Senate or House.


