## A WAR AT HOME

Huron Harriet: While the close attention of the public is commanded by the navy and the movements of the army in connection with the troubles with Mexico, another war is in progress on our own soil that would in ordinary times prove the leading attraction. This is the war being waged by the militia of Colorado upon a mining camp occupied by laboring men, their wives and children. The militia of Colorado had already made for themselves and their state a reputation that would prove a strong card only in the lower regions of the hereafter and they are now daily adding to the questionable renown borne by their arms. A census this morning on the dead lying in the camp swept for hours by the guns of this militant host revealed 33 bodies of persons slain and of the 33 there were 13 dead children and 1 dead woman. Whereupon the individual in command of this murdering band of legalized desperadoes called upon the governor of the state for reinforcements—for more men with guns and bullets to shoot down more defenseless children and women. Colorado is not expected to be ashamed of its conduct, but those living in other states can manifest their shame that one of the sisterhood should thus yield complacent obedience to the demands of soulless corporations which insist that human life shall be the penalty of human ambition to receive fair compensation for toil. The reckless disregard of the state of Colorado for the constitutional rights of its citizens has recently been accentuated in the imprisonment of a woman 33 years of age whose offense was the exercise of the constitutional guarantee of free speech. When habeas corpus proceedings were instituted, along with a probability that the courts would have to face the issue, this aged woman was let out of jail and all efforts to find a man that would admit the plea that she had failed. She can get out of the state, but she cannot have her wrongs adjudicated in tribunals superior for that purpose. Meanwhile the state authorities are showing the majesty of their kind of government by sending down helpless women and children, a part of the code of the state, to the imprisonment of old women and children against corporations.

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## EX-GOV. FOLK'S SPEECH

On the occasion of Col. Bryan's birthday reception former Governor Folk of Missouri, now chief counsel of the interstate commerce commission, said in part: "The best sermons today are political speeches and could be preached from the pulpit as well as from the stump; the best political speeches are sermons and could be uttered from the pulpit as well as from the stump. The statesman of today is advocating living, vital christianity and the divine is preaching the gospel of a new democracy. This new democracy is a religion of brotherhood among men; a religion that says 'thou shalt not lie; thou shalt not steal'; a religion which demands more of the Golden Rule in government and in our daily lives. It would have all unite in enforcing the laws and in counteracting any attempt to defy them. It would array class against class, but would preserve the rights of all by causing each to respect the rights of the other. It would not attack wealth in itself but wage unending war against the conditions which create poverty; it would protect property rights but would recognize the fact that property rights should never be inconsistent with human rights. It would assail not men but the evil that men do, and would seek as a remedy for existing wrongs not less government; by the people but more government by the people; not more manhood; not more cunning but more conscience. It would hasten the coming of the day when liberty and justice shall reign supreme and each man's good shall be all men's aim. "The one man who has done more than any other to awaken the conscience of the nation is he in whose name we meet tonight. He has been the great moral teacher of this generation and his power for good will be felt as long as time shall last. He now sits at the right hand of the greatest president the republic has had since the civil war. Together they are waging the battle of the common man—to give to each man an equal opportunity to live and labor and to enjoy the fruits of honest toil. "The awakening of industry has already commenced, and the country will soon enter upon a period of genuine prosperity such as it has never known before. It will differ from the prosperity of ten years ago, in that it will be the prosperity of the average man instead of the favored few. The day has gone when many millions can be filched from the public to enrich some individual through watered stock or a public service corporation. "The day is dawning when each man will be given the equal opportunity in life's battle that belongs to him. The new prosperity will not rest upon privilege to a few but upon denial of privilege to any. It will be a recognition of the idea that it is better for all the people to be prosperous than for a few to be over rich. "Woodrow Wilson has been president a year, and his administration has been unparalleled in achievements for the common good. He has taken graft out of the tariff. The income tax and the election of United States senators by the people have become achieved reforms during his administration. The currency system has been remodeled upon a safe and elastic basis whereby the nation has been saved from the domination of a few money-mad financiers. This is the first currency bill enacted in this country in the interest of the public and will operate for the welfare of all. "While much has been accomplished, there is a great deal more to be done. Before another year it will be just as great a crime to plunder the public through a corporation as it is now to personally rob an individual. There will be individual responsibility on the part of those who operate corporations for the acts of the corporation. The trusts will be suppressed by such methods as will cause no shock to fair business by reason of the violent changes from the unnatural conditions that have grown up under a monopoly fostering system. Monopoly will be uprooted in the Wilson way, quietly, firmly, honestly and without injury to the innocent and lawabiding. "A presidential primary law will be enacted whereby the people will be able to select their own nominees without the intervention of conventions. "In his efforts for the public good the president has behind him the American people more solidly than any other president has had since the beginning of the republic. Under his captaincy the people are beginning to appreciate the full meaning of democracy, and the party standing for these ideals will have the approval of the American voters indefinitely."

Sioux Falls, April 21.—Hans Ustrud, formerly prominent in republican ranks has issued a public statement telling why he joined the moose party. He denies that he is a disappointed office seeker. He was elected to every office he ever ran for on the republican ticket. He says he has joined the moose party because the republican party is not progressive and cannot be under its present alignment. He says the moose party may win but it has good principles and he proposes to help them with his influence and support.

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## THE PRESIDENT ARMED

Washington, D. C., April 22.—The senate, at 3:20 this morning, by a vote of 72 to 18, passed the Mexican resolution "justifying" the president's course in Mexico. Bloodshed at Vera Cruz stopped the flood of oratory and the republican opposition. Not since the Spanish war have such dramatic scenes been enacted. The house, at 10:28 this morning, passed the "war resolution," by a viva voce vote and sent it to the president. After a considerable fight, the president has been sustained in his Mexican policy and will now conduct the war without interruption.

## CONQUEST COMPLETED

Vera Cruz, April 22.—The Americans assumed complete control of the city shortly after noon. None were killed today and all non-combatants are safe.

## CHARGING THE ENEMY

Vera Cruz, April 22.—The combined fleets of Admirals Badger and Fletcher are today knocking Vera Cruz. Marines and blue jackets are picking off sharpshooters from the house tops and three thousand marines in fan shaped formation began at 8 o'clock to charge on the Mexicans. Still firing, they marched steadily through the city clearing every section before them. Machine guns opened fire, destroying several adobe houses. All the Mexican dead and wounded were low caste natives.

## REBELS MAY JOIN HEURTA

Washington, April 23.—Reports from the situation in Mexico has led the department to believe that all rebel forces in Mexico will join Heurta in his attempt to fight United States forces now in Mexico. A merchant vessel, loaded with ammunition for the Herta government, was seized in Vera Cruz, and released upon agreement with the German consul that the cargo would be returned at once to the manufacturer in Germany.

Mother Jones, the good angel of the laboring men in the mining industry, has been released from the Colorado jail, in which she has been long incarcerated as a military prisoner, and will go her way. The public would not like to know what offense was charged against the aged woman, but it probably never will know. There is great contempt for the rights and privileges of the poor citizens of the republic in Colorado.

## ROUGH RIDERS ARE READY

Washington, D. C., April 20.—Col. Melvin Grigsby of Sioux Falls, of rough rider fame, has tendered his services to President Wilson to be used in the event of war between the United States and Mexico. He offers to raise a brigade of three full regiments of western cowboys. Col. Grigsby's tender was presented to the president at the White House this morning, immediately following the cabinet meeting. When the act of congress providing for volunteers for the Spanish war was pending in the spring of 1898 Col. Grigsby came to Washington and secured an amendment to the bill which provided for the three regiments of cowboys to be enlisted from the nation at large, the officers to be appointed by the president. Largely on account of Col. Grigsby's service in this connection President McKinley appointed him to command one of the regiments. His territory embraced the two Dakotas, Nebraska and Montana. He secured the muster of twelve troops in seventeen days. Col. Grigsby now feels that if war shall be declared with Mexico he could organize a full brigade of three regiments inside of thirty days.
