BAD MEN

Two Desperate Brothers Killed by an Officer at Hinckley, Minn.

A Tragedy in Mississippi—Deaths of Blood Committed on Christmas in Various Sections.

HINCKLEY, Minn., Dec. 26.—The bodies of two desperadoes lie at the city hospital, having been shot dead by Marshal Booth. At 11 o'clock Thursday morning Michael, John and Peter Kane, brothers, came into town and in less than an hour had driven everybody off the street by indiscriminately firing revolvers and flourishing knives.

KILLED THE POSTMASTER.

CARBOLLETON, Miss., Dec. 26.—A tragedy occurred on the principal business street in this town at noon Thursday in which John Prentiss Matthews, the Republican postmaster at this place, was killed by W. S. McBride, a wealthy young druggist.

MANY ALTERCATIONS IN KANSAS CITY.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 26.—No less than four cases of attempted murder occurred here Thursday. William Barnes (colored) quarreled with George Taylor (also colored) and Taylor struck Barnes over the head with a hatchet, producing a fatal wound.

HUMANS ROASTED.

A Mother and Three Children Burned to Death at Rochester.

Fatal Flames at Other Points—Fire Destroys the Masonic Temple at Baltimore—Loss, \$350,000.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 26.—A terrible conflagration occurred about 3 o'clock, a. m., whereby a woman and three children lost their lives. The victims were Mrs. John Dietrich, of No. 7 Orchard street, and her three children, Libbie, aged 6 years; Jacob, aged 3, and Louis, aged 11 months.

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MASONS BURNED OUT.

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 26.—The imposing Masonic Temple which occupied a prominent site on Charles avenue was on Thursday almost completely destroyed by fire, together with a large amount of valuable property belonging to the order and to the Masons individually.

FIGHTING THE SIOUX.

SKIRMISH BETWEEN THE TROOPS AND THE REDSKINS NEAR BATTLE CREEK, S. D.—Several of the Indians killed—Failure of the Peace Party's Mission.

CAMP NEAR BATTLE CREEK, S. D.

LEWISTON, Ky., Dec. 26.—In a drunken row at Chilburg, this county, Thursday morning James Parton, of Jacks Creek, was killed. Two or three others were injured.

PINE RIDGE, S. D., Dec. 26.

The peace party failed, as was predicted. Five of the friendlies are in, and report that the rest are on their way. The enemy are described as crazy, wild and wholly unmanageable.

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 26.

Major Carroll made a forced march Tuesday night with fifty-five cavalrymen, covering sixty-five miles in fourteen hours upon the Cannon Ball, and arriving at New England City at 8 a. m. This was in compliance with orders from Fort Yates by courier to rescue Captain Fountain, of the Eighth Cavalry, who was surrounded in the Cave hills by 300 Indians.

KILLED BY AN EXPLOSION.

FAILURE AT COUNCIL BLUFFS.

THE DRY-GOODS FIRM OF EISEMAN & CO. Failed to Make an Assignment. COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Dec. 26.—One of the largest failures that has occurred in this city in some time was that of Henry Eisenman & Co. Thursday. The firm did a large dry goods and clothing business. The liabilities are estimated at \$300,000 and the assets at \$250,000.
