## THE FAIR!

The Thirteenth Annual Fair and Races a Success.

The Weather Was Fine and the Attendance Large.

We are glad to be able to chronicle that our fair this year went far ahead of that of last and all conditions being favorable we can safely promise that it will now become better every year. We need badly a new floral hall, the one now in use is in such bad shape that people do not care to make exhibits, a slight rain would ruin everything, and then there are no conveniences. But from what we hear we shall have a nice new hall next year and the ladies will bring all their pretty fancy work and take pleasure in seeing a neat hall well filled. This year the exhibit in fancy work was not very large but it was all tasty and pretty. The children's corner was the center of attraction. They fairly outdid themselves. The specimens of cake, pies, bread, etc., looked good enough to eat, certainly, and the fancy work, drawings, etc., made one wonder that a child under fifteen years of age could do it. The collection of paintings, though small, were fine and showed skilled hands.

We wonder when we see the beautiful and thrifty plants and flowers with which most of our housewives of Yale fill their windows why it is we see so few plants at the fair. The center of the building should be used for this purpose, a circular stand built on purpose would be just the thing. Flowers add so much to the beauty of a room. We hope next year to see this carried out. Just at the corner past the paintings and plants we met Miss Aldritt with her knitting machine, which is quite a curiosity to a great many and interesting to all.

Next in line was a fine exhibit of cloaks, capes, jackets and trimmed hats by Mrs. J. C. Holden. This is something that Mrs. Holden has lately gone into and the scheme promises full success. Across the hall a good exhibit of cloaks, wraps, clothing, table spreads, etc. was made by W. H. Ballentine. An excellent exhibit of sewing machines came next, superintended by C. Cooper. Around the corner were several pianos and organs, exhibited by R. S. Patterson. A good show of harness, etc. was made by Jno. McCormick & Sons.

On the vegetable side some grains were shown while the array of vegetables was large and excellent. Enormous cabbages, pumpkins, squashes, beets, potatoes and other vegetables graced the shelves and presented a fine appearance. Across, the fruit was placed but the shelves were not nearly as full as we would like to have seen, nor was there such a collection of canned fruits, jellies, etc. as of yore, or of butter and bread. Outside there was a small exhibit of poultry also of stock.

W. H. Harris, of Yale, made a good display of wagons, carriages, etc. as did also M. J. Bourke, of Brockway. The total number of entries to the fair was 709. The total receipts from all sources \$735.10. It is not known as yet what the expenses are but the society believes it will be money ahead.

The fair closed on Thursday afternoon with some fine races. A large attendance was present to witness the sport. Here is the result:
