The parents of Mr. Parkinson were born in County of Down, Ireland and were members of the Church of England until coming to Michigan, when they united with the Presbyterian church and it was in this latter faith that their son was trained.

They have heard the stories told by Michael Reid, C. A. Hovey and Wm. O'Connor. A movement is on foot to assess each candidate \$250.

# A Grand Success.



# SENT TO JAIL.

# A Port Huron Girl in Trouble at Detroit—She Stole a Trunk.

The Detroit Tribune publishes the following:  
Lizzie Michaels, a Port Huron girl about nineteen years old, was a defendant in the Police Court yesterday morning and pleaded not guilty to the larceny of a trunk and contents belonging to Nellie Jordan, of Yale, and valued at \$150.  
The Michaels girl up to four weeks ago had roomed at the house of Mrs. Hannah Drew, of 15 East Park Place. She left this house and went to rooming at 51 West Park place. Here she claimed she was a variety dancer and was resting for the summer. Ten days ago she had a large trunk brought to the house, and immediately arrayed herself in some of the clothing that was in it. Not content with wearing the things herself, she made presents of the clothing in it to different friends and this led to her arrest.  
Sunday night she left the Ganouder household at 51 West Park place and engaged a room at 43 West Park place and commenced to carry her belongings to that house. Mrs. Ganouder missed some of her wearing apparel and on looking into Lizzie's trunk found the missing articles. She called for a policeman, but Lizzie escaped arrest on returning the property.  
The trunk, which was the property of Nellie Jordan, had been left at 15 Park place while the owner visited her home in Yale. Ten days ago, while Lizzie Michaels was visiting Mrs. Drew, she was told that Mr. Drew had received a letter from Nellie Jordan to the effect that William Jordan would call with a written order and get the trunk. The next morning an expressman called and handed Mrs. Drew an order for the trunk. This order, instead of being from Mr. McDonald, was written by Lizzie Michaels. It was taken to Lizzie's room at 51 Park place. When the wagon sent by McDonald arrived he found that the trunk had been taken away. Complaint was made to the police and the matter was placed in the hands of Detective Lombard.
