POLITICALLY it looks like a great tidal wave of Republican success this fall, provided that the people turn out and vote. It was the Republican party that put the \$4.00 per ton duty on hay and kept the Canadians out of our market and it was the Democrat party that reduced this duty to \$2.00 per ton for a ton of 2240 lbs. making the present duty about \$1.80 per ton and it is the Canadian hay that is flooding the markets of all our Eastern cities that has reduced the price of the hay our farmers raise about \$2.00 per ton. The Democrat party also gave the Canadians our markets free on horses, sheep, hogs, barley, etc. In the case of our Flax Mill by letting in all foreign flax free it reduced the price of a carload of hauled flax \$275.00 per car and the price of the amount produced per year \$6,000.00, on the product of our Flax Mill. It has reduced wages of the Flax Mill employees and will reduce the price of the flax raised by our farmers next year over 15 per cent and it is very plain that there will be \$6,000.00 less to spend every year in this community which our foreign friends will have by the Democrat party giving them our market on flax. It was the Republican party that protected our markets for the benefit of our farmers and the only chance they have of getting them back again is through the Republican party. Farmers turn out and vote for the party that works for your interests and get your neighbors to do the same.

SO FAR in this historic year of gloom and redemption eight States have voted for State officers. No man who studies the returns can find in them promise of the continuance of the Democrats in power. His election is assured. In another column you will read what good work Mr. Avery has done for the county.

D. N. Rannels, nominee for register of deeds on the Republican ticket, was in Yale Monday and attended the rally in the evening. Democrats and Republicans regardless of party say they will vote for "Uncle Dan" Rannels.

CONGRESSMAN WILSON said the bill passed by Congress "would give \$40,000,000 to the sugar trust the first year." He neglected to add that the party had taken \$40,000,000 from veterans' pensions to square away the amount on the books.

HARD times and low prices or no wages will continue so long as free-trade controls Washington. Vote for Horace G. Snover, who, if elected, will be a protective congressman.

In his canvass of the District, T. H. Parkinson finds that everything looks very favorable for his election to the state legislature from the third district, St. Clair county. We are pleased to learn of this, because we know, should Mr. Parkinson go to Lansing, that he is just the man to look after the interests of the district and state ably and well and that nothing will suffer from any carelessness of his but that everyone will be satisfied with his work.

GEORGE E. MALLORY, the Republican nominee for sheriff, is making an aggressive campaign, and all the signs point to his election next month by a good large majority.

NEXT to the Democratic party sheep are the cheapest thing in the market. Uncle Sam proposes under tariff reform to raise his wool in Australia and South America.

Political Pointers.
Fisher says he is for the free coinage of silver, that it is sure to be the great issue in 1896 and that if the democratic party does "not fight squarely upon a silver plank in 1896 he will leave the party." Surely that is explicit enough.

"Practical politics" consists wholly and entirely in voting for a principle. Malicious politics, or mugwumpys consists in voting to get revenge. Theoretical politics is voting a party ticket because of the name it bears. Impractical politics is staying at home in a slunk.

There has been, since the reciprocity treaty under the McKinley law was negotiated, a line of four vessels plying regularly between Baltimore and Brazilian ports. The abrogation of the treaty by the repeal of the McKinley law has so prostrated trade that the owners of the vessels are offering to sell them at half cost.

The election returns from Georgia look queer, the populists have made great gains all over the state, but the queer part is that they have made their greatest gains in congressional districts where the democrats favored free silver and the least gains where the democrats stood strong for Cleveland's financial views. Why will not intelligent men vote as they believe and not as they hate?

The political skies never looked brighter for Michigan Republicans than they are at present, and the party is united and enthusiastic. The opposition is, on the contrary, spiritless and disjointed. It dare not face national issues, and its weak attempts at "state issues" have thus far covered it with ridicule and contempt. If every Republican does his duty the result is only a question of the amount of majority. The danger lies in an over-confidence which would leave undone those things which prudence demands. This must be guarded against, and the best way to do it is for every Republican voter to work as though victory depended upon him alone.—State Republican.


