Competition among the bakers at Imlay City has brought the price of a loaf of bread down to two cents.

Carlos Dinsmore, of Imlay City, will attend a theological college to prepare himself for entering the ministry.

The evangelists, Kerr and Johns, made 116 converts while in Richmond. Their labors there have just closed.


