### General News.

Sanilac Centre needs some fire protection.

Huron county now has seven papers, the Caseville Critic being the latest.

There is a rumor that the Romeo Observer will be moved to Lexington.

A fire in Sanilac Centre destroyed the house of H. O. Babcock. Loss \$800, insurance \$250.

During the past year seventy-two criminal cases have been commenced in the Circuit Court.

Henry P. Jenney, the Capac lawyer, has been charged with more forgeries and remanded to jail.

Mathias Secord, a prosperous farmer of Arcadia, has become insane and removed to the asylum.

A grand opening will be held in the Maccabee temple in Port Huron, when the repairs are all made.

Dr. H. S. Watson, of Capac, has moved to Bay Port, where there is a good opening for a physician.

Henry Ludwig, a Port Huron electrician, has invented a self-rolling trolley for street cars which promises to be a great thing.

Four tramps stealing a ride on the baggage car next the engine were arrested at Imlay City and taken to the county jail.

The Congregational church in Port Huron will be run this year by voluntary subscriptions instead of renting the pews as heretofore.

Wm. Bottomley, a police officer in Port Huron for over 30 years, has been asked to hand in his resignation. Mr. Bottomley is getting along in years.

A barn belonging to John Batchelor of China township, burned last week, with 19 head of cattle, 3 horses and 20 tons of hay. Loss \$2,000, insurance \$1,100.

George Smith, of Marine City, was arrested and fined two dollars and costs of prosecution, for tearing down infectious disease cards from his residence.

Lexington is greatly excited over the finding of an abundance of oil about three miles north of the village. A company is being organized to develop matters.

The Huron County Democrat, published at Sand Beach, has been purchased by W. F. Brown, of the Uby Courier, and the plant removed to the latter place.

A horse belonging to Charles Donaldson, of Lynn, fell into a well and was there twenty-four hours before it could be gotten out. It is doubtful if the animal lives.

The Port Huron Times proposes to give to the ladies of Port Huron the editing and publishing of the Times for one day, the receipts to go for three public charities.

Two horses belonging to Charles Tucker, of East Goodland, were standing beside an open well, when one backed up and fell in, dragging the other after him. One of the horses was killed and the other badly injured.

The body of Arthur Hollister, of Worth, who was reported missing in Chicago last week, was found in the river there a few days since and it is believed he was murdered and robbed, as his money and valuables are gone, and his body thrown into the water. The remains were brought home.

In the forenoon of December 6th, a young woman threw herself in front of a Grand Trunk train near Lenox and before the train was stopped she was run over by the wheels of the locomotive and cars. She died shortly. Papers discovered her name to be Mrs. Celia Fowler and residence Detroit, but nothing more is known of her or why she did the deed.

Charles H. French, of Bad Axe, died last week at the age of 91 years. Deceased had been married 57 years and leaves a wife and thirteen children. In 1891 he was granted a pension on account of disease contracted while a soldier in the Black Hawk war, but did not receive any money during his lifetime. He lived in St. Clair county from 1851 to 1872.
