A Prosperous Year.

Notwithstanding the financial depression which has prevailed throughout the land, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows has experienced a remarkable record of prosperity during the past year. We learn from the report of the grand sire made at the recent session of the sovereign grand lodge at Chattanooga, Tenn., that there has been an increase in membership during the past year of 32,897, making the present membership over 800,000. There has been paid out for the relief of Odd Fellows, their widows and orphans children during the year the enormous sum of \$8,313,000. In other words the order has paid for relief \$276,083.33 in one month, \$66,548.65 a week, \$9,506.95 a day, \$336.12 an hour, \$6.61 a minute and 11 cents each second. This shows the amount of good that is being done by this noble order with the mite that is being paid in by each member annually, and the brotherhood points with pride to the work thus accomplished. The above statistics show that the order has faithfully and loyally obeyed the commands of its laws, "to visit the sick, relieve the distressed and educate the orphan."
