OUR SAM!

Rev. Mr. Bettes Going to Help the Cuban Patriots.

His Sea Yacht Will Start for Cuba This Week.

Minister and Crew Armed to the Teeth.

Rev. Sam Bettes, the wandering Evangelist of St. Clair county, has been heard from after a silence of nearly two years. He is now at Evansville, Ind., fitting out a war vessel to help the Cuban patriots. Sam tells the Evansville Courier that he spent 12 years on the high seas and was a bunco steerer for four years. He reformed four years ago and commenced to preach. All this will surprise his St. Clair county friends, who know that he has knocked around this county for the past 40 years.

The Courier says: The cry for help sent up by Cuban patriots in their struggle for freedom has been heard by Sam Bettes. He has fitted out a yacht which next week will go down to Cuba bearing 100 men to take up the banner of freedom.

The sea-going yacht, "Sam Bettes," has been moored for several days at the foot of Fulton avenue, and many inquiries were made to no purpose as to the queer craft. Last night after dark a gentleman invited a reporter for the Courier to visit the vessel. At the time appointed the reporter was at the landing and was quietly taken on board. The only occupants of the vessel were Rev. Samuel G. Bettes, the owner, and his two little children. A few words sufficed to explain that the boat was soon to put off to Cuba with men, arms and ammunition on board.

First the boat was examined. The "Sam Bettes" is 70 feet from fore to aft, and is strong enough for the roughest sea. It has two mast poles, each 30 feet above deck. The vessel is built of the best material throughout, the paneling in the cabin, the dining room and two sleeping apartments being of the rarest South America woods. In appearance the vessel is something like a miniature iron clad.

Mr. Bettes would not say when or from what place he would start for Cuba. The reporter inferred that Paducah would be the place of embarkation and that the time would be very soon. The men who will accompany him are an organized body of 100 and come principally from Ohio. Several Evansville young men, Mr. Bettes said, wish to join the party.

Mr. Bettes will have charge of the crew of the vessel, but the command of the soldiers will be taken by a West Point graduate, whose name is withheld on account of his being an officer in the United States army. The officer will resign his commission before he goes with the party.

The boat in the next few days will be supplied with a six-pound army piece which will be placed on the prow. Port holes along the side will furnish places for the rifles. The sides of the boat are thick, and when stuffed with cotton, will be impervious to small cannon firing from a distance. There is plenty of storage room for ammunition.

Mr. Bettes was asked why he was undertaking the expedition. He said: "Nothing but the desire I have of aiding the cause of freedom wherever battles are being fought in the name of freedom. I rest in the hope that the Cubans will be recognized as belligerents by our government. Then we shall be able to publicly go to their aid. As it now is, we have to run the gauntlet of our government as well as that of Spain. But Spain is broken now. Have you read the uprising in Spain under Don Carlos? Well, that means something to Cuba. It may end in the freedom of Cuba and the establishment of a democracy in Spain. Senor Castellor is said to be active again. Yes, Spain will have her own revolution to put her down."
