The Parliament of the Dominion of Canada has passed a bill by which one-fourth of the money in the reserve fund will hereafter be used and deposited by the Supreme Court in the United States. Probably \$30,000 will be placed within 60 days. The Order will also issue four and five thousand dollar policies. Prizes are offered to encourage the members to increase the Order.

DEATH OF JOHN HAYES.

Consumption Claimed Him a Victim on Thursday Last.

John Hayes died at the home of his father, Nicholas Hayes, at the family homestead on March 2, after a persistent illness of three years.

The deceased was 35 years of age, was born on the farm where he died and had passed his entire life there. He enjoyed an excellently large acquaintance throughout the surrounding townships and it is a universal comment that "Johnny" was everybody's friend and had no enemies.

He contracted tuberculosis about three years ago, which at first assumed the form of a severe cold. His family made every possible effort to save him and he was sent to Detroit, Saginaw, and Ann Arbor for treatment, in addition to constant attendance and careful treatment on the part of Dr. Cowie but it was all to no purpose.

Shortly before his death he made every arrangement for the disposition of his property, the funeral services and burial with as much care and business foresight as though conducting a business transaction. He accepted the Catholic sacrament at the hands of Fr. Laughran and expressed himself as ready to quit the struggle for life.

The funeral services were conducted at the Catholic church at Brockway on Sunday where Fr. Laughran delivered a most impressive sermon which was an eloquent argument in favor of living an honorable, pure and upright life preparatory to a peaceful death and eternal reward hereafter as in case of the deceased.

The remains were buried in Elmwood cemetery at Yale, beside deceased relatives and was followed to the grave by one of the largest processions ever seen in this community.

The concluding services at the grave were conducted by The Royal Arcanum of which he was a member and in which he had \$3,000 life insurance.

It is the universal opinion that a good man has gone to rest and whatever there may be in waiting as a merited reward for honesty, integrity, purity of thought and action, consideration for the rights and feelings of his fellows shall certainly be enjoyed throughout eternity by him whose entire life has been a living example in all these respects.
