Mrs. Grant Holden Unexpectedly Called Away.

Mrs. Holden came among us about three years ago. One month ago she gave birth to her first child, and her death was caused from the results of this birth. The funeral services were conducted at the home on Sunday last by Rev. Paul Desjardins. The remains were accompanied to the family cemetery lot of her father, E. G. Brown, at Brown City, by the Guards and members of the Lady Macabees of this place, of which organization she was a member. The touching kindness of the ladies of this order will be long remembered by the friends. The floral decorations presented by the order and also by other friends were extremely beautiful. Mrs. Holden left surviving her the babe and her husband who have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community.

A kind, lovable nature has been taken from us and it seems impossible for the loved ones she left to become reconciled to their irreparable loss, but to these we offer the comfort of the hope expressed in the beautiful thought contained in the following:

Was the Accident By Which Orrin Holcomb

Met an Untimely Death on Friday Last.

BARN BLOWN DOWN.

The Storm of Friday Last Did Lots of Damage in This Vicinity.

William Blackford, with a force of men were at work building the foundation for a bank barn on the Stephen Beadle farm, northwest of the village, occupied by Mr. Slosser. Two sides of the wall had been made when the storm came up. Orrin Holcomb was mixing mortar near by and ran to the barn for shelter. When the crash came which split the building in two, he started out to the side when the building was blown with full force against him. Those who witnessed the accident hastened to the rescue and found the dead body of their fellow workman with the top of his head horribly crushed and otherwise terribly bruised. He must have instantly died. The remains were tenderly cared for and the news carried to the family who were grief stricken. The funeral was held on Monday at the M. P. church, being conducted by the pastor, Rev. E. W. Cooper, and the remains taken to Elmwood cemetery.

Orrin Holcomb, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Holcomb, was born in Brockway township and had been lived until May he would have seen his 30th birthday. He was a young man who was respected for his honesty and kind disposition. The very large attendance at the funeral showed that he was held in great esteem by the community.
